The Tallassee City Board of Education has been working on a building plan for Tallassee High School for over a year. To begin with, we are both excited and appreciative that the Tallassee City Council passed a one cent sales tax increase for the City of Tallassee west of the Tallapoosa River. Half of that tax is to be designated to the school system for rebuilding our high school.

The plan moving forward is to re-build Tallassee High School in phases on the same campus. One goal is to be able to keep the look and feel of the original architecture of the buildings while improving the security, safety, and overall facilities. The first stage will see improvements to our parking areas and the building of a fine arts center. We have roughly half of our students that participate in music and band and our current facility is grossly undersized and outdated. Our current auditorium seats approximately 450 students and our student body has about 550 students. Currently, the auditorium will not hold an assembly for their school. We want to be able to upgrade our facilities to meet the needs of our students and the programs in which they participate.

Soon after the first stage is completed, a replacement building will be built to replace the Annex. This building would be home to new science labs, classrooms, and school office spaces. As funding is available, a new main building



would be built. It is difficult to know when all phases will be complete. As of now, we do not have all the funding needed to re-build our high school, however we plan to 'restructured' debt in the future to help us fund these next stages. Additional revenue streams like the extra one cent sales tax will help us accomplish our goal sooner rather than later.

We are indeed moving forward in our system, but not just in rebuilding THS. We have goals of expanding dual enrollment offerings and greatly expanding our STEAM (Science, Technology, Engineering, Arts, and Math) focus. Our plan is to have new STEM labs at Tallassee Elementary School and Southside Middle School next school year. In the past many of our STEM activities like robotics have been offered to our enrichment students. Our new STEM focus will offer these learning opportunities to all students. Eventually this STEM focus will reach Tallassee High School. We are excided about the direction of our schools and look forward to our next steps together.

Veteran choral music educators Gene Davis and James Bush visited Tallassee High School recently to work with the men's choir.

Gene Davis taught at Robert E. Lee High School in Montgomery from 1974-2002, and later served as the choral director at Huntingdon College.

"Mrs. Davis is the reason I became a music educator," said Michael Bird, assistant choral and band director for Tallassee City Schools. "She planted that seed when I was in high school. One day, out of nowhere, she pulled me aside and said, 'have you thought about pursuing music education in college?'. Until then, I wasn't really sure what I wanted to do with my life."

Bird said Davis's teaching methods are top-notch. She moves around the room, changes placement of students, and teaches various physical exercises that improve singing skills.

"She's a force of nature, that's for sure," Bird said. "And interestingly, back in 1981, a young Jerry Cunningham did his student teaching internship with Gene Davis at Robert E. Lee," Bird continued. "We owe a great deal of gratitude to Mrs. Davis for her influence on all of us."

James Bush.

Mr. Bush once served as the Glee Club director at THS, and later became an assistant principal and finally Principal. Mr. Bush retired as Principal of Tallassee Elementary School several years ago, but has remained active in the program.

"I don't know if there's a more beautiful male voice in the world than James Bush's God-given instrument," Bird said. "I could listen to him sing from now until the end of time and never get tired of hearing him."

Mr. Bush stopped in to give tips to the young men on how to keep their pitches accurate, even while singing softly. The tendency to sing too loud is common, according to Bird.

"This all started one day at McDonalds. I ran into Mr. Bush and he said, 'why do you let those boys sing so loudly?'. I thought that the students needed to see Mr. Bush as more than someone who does puppets and balloons; they needed to meet him as a vocal coach. I've invited him to return as often as he likes," Bird concluded.

There are many people to thank for the success of JazzFest. Each year, I am blown away by the enthusiasm and support of not only our own community, but people across the state who come to the Tallassee High School Auditorium to hear great high school and college bands.

We are blessed to have Auburn University every year. Their director, Dr. Mike Pendowski, is a Grammy-winning film composer and arranger, and has several degrees in conducting and



performance. Since he landed at Auburn seven years ago, he has been with us ever since. Dr. Pendowski is going to be partnering with us as we launch a Summer Jazz Camp in Tallassee next year,

sponsored by Auburn University but based at Tallassee High School.

Troy University has also been along for the eight years of our festival, having performed at five of the Jazz Fest dates. They were also the featured band at the very first Jazz Fest in



2011.

This was the closest to 'dream lineup' we have had. We had eight high schools and two colleges performing to capacity crowds at the THS Auditorium. During Auburn's per-

formance, for example, it was standing room only on the main floor as well as the balcony. The setting was loose and casual, ideal for jazz music on a springtime evening.



I enjoyed the camaraderie of the directors and students the most.

I really appreciated the cooperation of the rest of our department. Our director of bands, Robby Glasscock, allows me to serve as the event coordinator for JazzFest and I love putting it together. Robby is always working so hard behind the scenes to make our band program great. I don't think he gets recognized enough for the great things he has done while he has been at Tallassee. Our students really liked playing on WSFA-TV 12 and WAKA-TV 8, as well.

There would be no jazz festival without Mike Hammonds. Mike is from Tallassee and was a band director in the U.S. Army before coming back home. He currently writes music

compositions for the C.L. Barnhouse Company, which publishes band music. He works with our jazz bands at Southside and THS. He has a passion for music education and it is evident in everything he touches.

Amanda Glasscock was our band liaison for this event. She ran back and forth between the warmup and performance



areas and made sure everyone was happy and had what they needed. Debbie Rogers made sure that we had all the concessions we would need to sell to the hundreds of students we had on campus. Brent Langley and the Music Boosters were on hand, working hard to please everyone. We also had students serving as stage crew all evening, moving equipment and meeting the demands of each band director.

I also want to recognize my choral colleague Amanda Anderson. She has made a tremendous difference in our program since she came here, and anyone who heard her amazing voice Friday night will probably want her to stay around for a while. She was the featured soloist on the THS Jazz Band's performance of the famous torch song, "Cry Me a River."

It was all made possible by Tommy Lawrence, who operated the sound and lights for the festival. He was upstairs, so nobody could see him, but occasionally he was heard. I am grateful to all of these people for what they did to make Tallassee look good -- here's to the ninth annual JazzFest next year!

The "Roots" of The Christian's Life

"And I pray that Christ will be more and more at home in your hearts, living within you as you trust in him. May your roots go down deep into the soil of God's marvelous love; and may you be able to feel and understand, as all God's children should, how long, how wide, how deep, and how high his love really is; and to experience this love for yourselves, though it is so great that you will never see the end of it or fully know or understand it. And so at last you will be filled up with God himself." - Ephesians 3:17-19 (TLB)

Near Mpumalanga, South Africa, are the marvelous and mysterious Echo Caves. These caves were rediscovered in the last century and turned into a tourist site. The Echo Caves are home to a truly remarkable ecosystem. One of the more amazing things found there is the wild fig tree. As far as plant life goes, these fig trees appear to be normal run-of-the-mill fruit bushes. I mean who doesn't like fig newtons? I digress...but what makes these fig trees so famous is the unseen: their roots. Researchers and spelunking scientists have followed the roots of these trees deep into Echo Caves — 400 feet deep, to be precise — the deepest known root system in the world! In

We experience this love vertically, so let us stop and be overwhelmed at God's great love for us (Ephesians 2:1-2) and rest in God's forgiveness towards us (Ephesians 4:32) so "at last we will be filled up with God himself."
