MARIJUANA IS BACK BEFORE THE LEGISLATURE

On Wednesday, April 5 the Senate Agriculture and Forestry Committee considered legislation to significantly increase the number of medical cannabis licenses that the state will award to businesses.

The 2021 legislation that legalized medical marijuana in the state of Alabama, strictly restricted the number of licenses that could be awarded. The most sought-after license is the integrator license, it allows a business to grow, process, transport, and dispense medical cannabis. The legislation limited that to a maximum of five licenses.

Senate Bill 276 would increase the number of licenses of integrators from five to 15. It also increases the number of dispensary and process licenses. SB276 is sponsored by Senator David Sessions (R-Grand Bay).

A number of persons spoke against the bill, arguing that increasing the number of licenses would too severely limited the profitability of the producers. Even some denied applicants who are presently suing the state over their permit denial spoke against Sessions' proposed solution.

SB276 was carried over by the Committee on Wednesday; but it could potentially return.

House Rejects Senate Gambling Bill

On Thursday the Alabama House of Representatives passed a motion of non-concurrence on the Senate's gaming substitute sending the legislation to a conference committee.

"From the very beginning, we had three key goals with the House's comprehensive legislation," said Speaker of the House Nathaniel Ledbetter (R-Rainsville) in a statement. "Those included eliminating illegal gaming operations in the state of Alabama, developing a framework for the taxation and regulation of facilities that obtain licenses through an open-bid process and establishing a lottery that benefits education and education only."

Rep. Chris Blackshear (R-Phenix City) sponsored the legislation.

"More than 14 months went into crafting this package – the first comprehensive gaming plan to ever pass in the Alabama House of Representatives," said Blackshear. "We were thoughtful in our approach to addressing every aspect of this issue, and I truly feel that the House's final product is what the people want to vote on "

The House's rejection of the Senate's more scaled back plan means that the Conference Committee will be tasked with drafting a third gambling bill – that no one has seen before.



Few Surprises in March 5th Primary Results



and statewide politics, most of the action was in the GOP Primary. The big winners were Donald Trump, Barry Moore and Sarah Stewart. As expected, Donald Trump trounced all his GOP "would be" challengers in

the Heart of Dixie. The former president received 84% of the vote in our Alabama Primary and will probably win our state by around a 63% to 37% margin in the November General Election rematch against the hapless Joe Biden, if indeed Biden makes it to the fall contest.

The biggest surprise was Congressman Barry Moore's upset victory over fellow GOP Congressman Jerry Carl in the newly drawn 1st Congressional District. These two conservative U.S. House members were thrown into the same district with the federal courts decision to redraw our congressional lines in an attempt to create a new majority minority district.

When the new 1st Congressional District was dictated, it was assumed by casual observers, pundits, and Washington insiders that Jerry Carl would easily win reelection because on paper he was the incumbent. He was the sitting congressman in the old 1st district and two-thirds of the people in that House seat were his constituents. The other one-third of the new district is comprised of the Wiregrass counties of Houston, Henry, Geneva, Coffee, Dale, and Covington.

When you corral this conservative Wiregrass region with the very conservative, populous Baldwin County, you have created one of the most conservative Republican congressional districts in the nation. The key to Moore's slim victory was his ability to penetrate some of the large Baldwin County vote and convince them that he was more conservative than Carl. However, the essential key was that Moore rode a tremendous wave of "friends and neighbors" support from his home folks in the Wiregrass.

He ran through the Wiregrass like a scalded dog. He got a whopping 74% in Covington County, 78% in Houston and Dale counties, 82% in Geneva, and racked up 84% of the vote in his home county of Coffee. Looks like the folks in the Wiregrass stood up and said, "Not so fast Mobile, we would like to have a congressman from our neighborhood if you don't mind." Moore beat Carl

There were very few surprises in our March 5 primary results. Since we are 52% to 48% and will go back to Washington as the Congressman from the 1st Congressional District of Alabama rather than the 2nd Congressional District.

> Our other three seniority laden and thus powerful Republican Congressman are Robert Aderholt, Mike Rogers, and Gary Palmer. All coasted to landslide reelection victories. Robert Aderholt, a veteran of 28 years in the U.S. House, won with 87% of the vote in his 4th Congressional District. Mike Rogers, the current Chairman of the House Armed Services Committee who hails from Calhoun County and is closing in on 20 years in the U.S. House beat back two opponents with 81% of the vote.

> Jefferson-Shelby County Congressman Gary Palmer garnered a very impressive 84% of the vote against two viable opponents in his reelection to his sixth two-year term. He is moving up in power and prestige in the U.S. House.

> Justice Sarah Stewart won an impressive 61% to 39%, stomping of her opponent Bryan Taylor in her race to become Alabama's Supreme Court Chief Justice. She is imminently qualified for this very important position in Alabama government. The Chief Justice of the Alabama Supreme Court not only renders important judicial decisions, along with the eight other members, they are also the administrator of the entire state judicial system. Sarah has served six years as an Associate Justice of the Supreme Court and prior to that was a Circuit Judge in Mobile for 16 years.

> Twinkle Andress Cavanaugh was reelected to her fourth four-year term as President of the Alabama Public Commission with the same 61% to 39% margin of victory as Sarah Stewart. Alabama Court of Civil Appeals Judge Chad Hanson won reelection to his second term with a 56% to 44% margin of victory.

> Rich Anderson defeated fellow Assistant Attorney General Thomas Govan by a similar 56% to 44% margin in a race for a place on the Court of Criminal Appeals. This was an open being vacated by popular jurist Chris McCool who is moving up to the State Supreme Court.

> Next week, we will discuss the most hotly contested race this year, the contest for the new 2nd Congressional District.

Runoffs Set for New 2nd District Congressional Primary Races

The most interesting and paramount race on the ballot in the March 5th primaries was the one for the new open 2nd Congressional District.

This gerrymandered new district was created by the Federal Courts to implement a new Democratic/Black District in the Heart of Dixie. The Democratic nominee will be favored to win this seat in November. When the plaintiffs proposed their new district plan to the Court, they attached a chart, which illustrated that had there been a Democratic vs. Republican congressional race on the ballot the Democrat would have won in 16 of the 17 races. Washington insiders are handicapping this race as a Democratic pickup.

However, the Republican Party is not going to give this seat up without a major fight. There will be an avalanche of campaign money flowing from Washington into this race in the fall. This seat could be the deciding factor into which party has the majority in the U.S. House of Representatives.

With it being an open seat, both parties had a plethora of candidates. There were seven GOP aspirants and 11 Democratic hopefuls. Many of the Democrats were legislators, who lived outside the district. The ones who had no ties to the district faired rather poorly.

From the beginning, the front runner for the Republican nomination was former Montgomery State Senator Dick Brewbaker. He indeed led the ticket on March 5 with 39% of the vote. He will be joined by political newcomer Caroleene Dobson, who received 27%. She ran a perfect campaign and edged State Senator Greg Albritton out of the runoff. Albritton, who did very little campaigning got 25% of the vote, mostly from the southern part of the district.

Brewbaker got the bulk of his votes in Montgomery. He received 67% of the vote in his home county. He was a very accomplished and diligent State Representative and State Senator, and his family owned a very well known and respected car dealership for generations. He enjoys immense name identification in the Montgomery River Region.

Caroleene Dobson is a young mother and Montgomery attorney with an undergraduate degree from Harvard and law degree from Baylor. She grew up in Monroe County, the daughter of a prominent cattle family. She did well in the rural counties of the district, probably bolstered by her being endorsed by Alfa. She defeated Brewbaker in Mobile and the southern part of the district. She has a chance to prevail in the April 16 runoff. However, with over a 12-point lead, Brewbaker will be favored to emerge as the Republican standard bearer for the fall battle royale.

Shomari Figures emerged as the new superstar in the Democratic Party with his very impressive performance in the Democratic primary on March 5. He garnered a whopping 44% of the vote Page 2 of 2 against 11 opponents, including five sitting Democratic State Legislators. The 2nd place finisher was Huntsville State Representative Anthony Daniels who finished with 23%. Representative Daniels is the State House of Representatives Minority Leader and began the race as the presumptive favorite.

Shomari Figures is the son of the very popular and prominent Mobile State Senator, Vivian Figures. His father, Michael Figures, was in this Mobile State Senate Seat prior to Vivian. He was a well-known Civil Rights Leader and State Senate Leader but died early in life. Shomari benefitted from his Mobile roots. He has also had a stellar career in Washington politics, working for the Obama Administration and more recently, Attorney General Merrick Garland. He also brought a boatload of Washington insider campaign money home with him, which helped propel him to an overwhelming and probably insurmountable lead

Shomari garnered nearly 50% of the vote in his native Mobile County. However, the big story is that he received 40% of the vote in the second most populous county, Montgomery. He carried Montgomery overwhelmingly despite veteran Montgomery Democratic Kingpin Joe Reed endorsing Mobile State Representative Napoleon Bracy.

Young Mr. Figures' smashing victory in Montgomery may very well mark the political death of Joe Reed and his Alabama Democratic Conference control of Montgomery. Poetically, Shomari's father, Michael Figures, split with Joe Reed's ADC 40 years ago and formed the New South Coalition. Shomari may have settled this score for his father.

Mobile State Representative Napoleon Bracy finished third with 15% of the vote. Most of his voters came from Mobile. Most of those votes will accrue to Shomari Figures, who will be the prohibitive favorite to win the Democratic runoff on April 16.



Espionage's Unintended Consequences

Fifty years ago, Americans were so distracted by Watergate that they failed to notice the unmasking of one of the most consequential spies during the Cold War.

Even today, few will remember the name Günter Guillaume; but most will remember a spy precipitating the fall of the West German Chancellor, Willy Brandt.

While it is hard to quantify exactly what **Justice Will Sellers** state secrets Guillaume disclosed to his

East German handlers, it is even more difficult to connect his espionage with any specific action taken or withheld which prevented or caused a foreign policy coup.

In fact, Guillaume's notoriety was not based on information he discovered but rather that he had worked his way up the West German political ladder and became Willy Brandt's personal secretary. In this capacity, Guillaume was privy to all top-secret communications Brandt received as chancellor, and 50 years ago, it was in the best interest of East Germany and its benefactor, the Soviet Union, to know exactly what West Germany and its NATO allies were thinking.

Guillaume and his wife were specifically recruited and trained to infiltrate the West German government. Before the construction of the Berlin Wall, travel between the two German nations was not restricted,

so it was easy to send an East German couple across the border with the cover story of escaping communism.

Under the direction of East German's Stasi spymaster, Markus Wolf, the Guillaumes found work in various departments of the Social Democratic Party. They were aided in their advancement by other Germans sympathetic to the East German cause, and while Guillaume was not initially advanced on his own merit, once he obtained a position, he worked very hard, showed ambition and was promoted. In many ways he was a sleeper agent, inserted into a country without a specific mission, but encouraged to work his way into a position of trust and influence.

At this time, Germany was the focus of Cold War tensions and the flash point in global foreign policy. Debates about US and Soviet foreign policy seemed to revolve around Germany in general and Berlin in particular. In fact, the "German Question" was the sole remaining unresolved issue of World War II. Germany was divided by what were supposed to be temporary post war boundaries, but as time wore on, the temporary became more permanent, but only Russia continued as an occupying power.

The West German government would not even recognize East Germany and advocated re-unification by a popular vote. In opposition, the Russians liked having a divided Germany not only out of fear of German economic power, but also to have a satellite country in the middle of Europe. Inasmuch as other recognized countries were firmly within the Soviet sphere of influence, Berlin and Germany represented unfinished business that both superpowers used as a demonstration of their commitment to their respective world orders.

Germany became a political football, and each time the Soviets tried to isolate Berlin with blockades and other obstacles to free travel, the US and its allies would respond. This action and reaction went back and forth until a stalemate was reached after it became clear that reunification was impossible.

With the construction of the Berlin Wall, the division of the two Germanys was obvious and apparent, but neither the United States nor its NATO allies was interested in going to war —which might have meant use of nuclear weapons — to stop a wall that recognized boundaries previously negotiated.

The true impact of the Berlin Wall was to stop the mass migration of Germans to the West for opportunity and advancement, but psychologically, its construction was a statement

> against reunification. From a political standpoint, once reunification was removed as an organizing principle for the West German government, a new policy had to be considered.

> As long as the possibility of reunification was present, West Germany could act boldly and refuse to establish diplomatic relations with any country other than Russia that treated East Germany as a separate country and dispute its post-war borders. But as time elapsed and the Wall separated the countries, a new policy emerged from the Social Democrats with the election of Willy Brandt.

> Brandt would advocate warmer relations with neighboring Soviet satellites, acknowledge East Germany and seek reproachment with

> Initially, the East Germans and Russians were suspicious and wanted to know if Brandt was sincere or if these actions were a ruse. The East Germans relied on Guillaume to confirm the chancellor's motives as

well as evaluate NATO's response to his acceptance of a divided Germany and Soviet influence in Eastern Europe. The Russians were afraid of NATO and its guarantor, the United States. Their hope was

that Brandt's actions would create a split in NATO and divide allies over how to deal with him, his vision for Germany, and relations with the East. With Guillaume's placement, they were able to read all correspondence between the German chancellor and other NATO

They learned that rather than dividing NATO, Brandt's actions were actually creating a

closer relationship with President Nixon, who supported the chancellor's policies as leverage against Soviet adventurism. Brandt's policies created a de-escalation of superpower hostilities, paving the way for détente. In the Cold War, achieving a peaceful co-existence was deemed progress, and while


Guillaume helped the Russians understand and accept Brandt's policies as sincere and legitimate, the Soviet leaders became concerned that exposing Guillaume could damage Brandt. Thus, they prevailed on the East Germans to curtail contacts lest through mis-adventure Guillaume's true loyalties might be revealed. It seemed in everyone's best interest to keep Brandt as chancellor, but Guillaume's wife

had been careless in transactions with her East German contacts. As West German counterintelligence more carefully scrutinized relocated East Germans in government, Guillaume's role as a spy came to light.

When he was confronted by West German authorities, he admitted that he was a proud communist. His exposure shocked the nation, and within a few weeks, the unintended consequence of Guillaume's espionage was Brandt's abrupt resignation.

Lincoln's 1860 Nomination: A Machiavellian Bargain

This country has witnessed numerous political Ward Hill Lamon, Lincoln's friend and schisms since the beginning of the republic. We are bodyguard, cast doubt on the means presently bombarded with diverse and often intense political views--some real and some superficial. A distinct difference in political philosophy existed in the mid-1800s, mainly in the form of Jeffersonian vs. Hamiltonian principles. Reflecting his identification

with the old protectionist Whigs, Lincoln, who idolized Henry Clay, supported Alexander Hamilton's program of central banking, internal improvements, protectionism, and consolidation of federal power.


John Fremont ran as the Republican Party's first presidential candidate in the 1856 election. The party was a non-entity in the majority of the South, thus no Republicans appeared on the ballot in most Southern States in 1856 or 1860. The Republican convention was held May 16-18, 1860, in Chicago, an industrial and financial city. William Seward, a former lawyer, senator, and governor from New York, was the overwhelming favorite. Based on the practice of the day, Seward did not attend the convention, but instead sent Thurlow Weed, his political manager. Chicago bubbled with excitement in anticipation of the second Republican convention, held at the Wigwam, a new convention center built as part of the agreement to host the event.

Seward and Weed had good reason to be confident. "It required 233 votes to win, and New York alone represented almost a third of that total." Other candidates included Ohio's Salmon P. Chase, Missouri's Edward Bates, and Pennsylvania's Simon Cameron. Abraham Lincoln was considered a dark horse. His friend, Illinois Judge David Davis, was his campaign manager, and he was also allied with Norman Judd, the New York born representative from Illinois. "On May 8, just over a week before the convention, in Decatur, Lincoln was selected by his home State Republicans." Although less well known than the other candidates, Lincoln's February 27, 1860, Cooper Union Speech resonated with many Republicans, especially his opposition to slavery expansion and secession. Also, Lincoln's career had shown him to be a master of sophistry and fiscal irresponsibility. As part of the "Long Nine," Lincoln helped push Illinois to the brink of bankruptcy.

Accurately predicting Seward would not win on the first ballot, Lincoln and his team "printed hundreds of counterfeit tickets and distributed them to Lincoln supporters with instructions to show up early—in order to displace Seward's supporters." On May 16-17, while Weed entertained delegates and promised "oceans of money" for future projects, Davis and Judd "lobbied" States unfriendly to Seward, e.g., Indiana, New Hampshire, Maine, Vermont, etc.

On May 18th Seward's supporters, accompanied by a brass band, marched toward the Wigwam. Upon arrival they discovered Lincoln supporters with counterfeit tickets occupying their rightful seats. Despite the shady tactics of Lincoln and his supporters, Seward's backers remained confident. "Seward won the first ballot with 173 votes and Lincoln followed with 102 votes; Cameron, Chase, Bates, and the others received fifty votes or less, meaning the contest now boiled down to Seward and Lincoln. The wheeling and dealing of Lincoln's team now came into play and on the second ballot Seward received 184 votes versus 181 votes for Lincoln. As the third vote commenced, it was clear the momentum had shifted strongly toward the underdog. The third and final ballot resulted in 231 votes for Lincoln, making his stunning victory complete."

employed to secure Lincoln's nomination: "He was also nominated by means of a corrupt bargain entered into by Simon Cameron, of Pennsylvania and Caleb Smith, of Indiana, provided Lincoln would pledge them cabinet positions. These pledges Lincoln fulfilled and thus made them a party to corrupt bargains." All involved were handsomely rewarded. For example, Chase was named Secretary of the Treasury and Bates was named Attorney General. Even runner-up Seward was named Secretary of State.



Entering the 1860 election, the Republican Party was backed by powerful factions, e.g., Northern railroad and industrialist interests. The railroads stood to benefit tremendously from federal subsidies (corporate welfare). One of Lincoln's supporters at the Chicago Convention was Grenville Dodge, the railroad expert Lincoln had consulted during his Iowa trip in 1859. Dodge, John A. Dix, Thomas C. Durant, John I. Blair, Norman B. Judd, and others saw "Lincoln vital to their plans of building a Pacific railroad from the Mississippi River..."

April is Confederate History and Heritage Month. Since the Confederacy was based on State sovereignty and voluntary, consensual government, most media will ignore it. This is the antithesis of "globalist" thinking. The next article will delve into the election of 1860 and provide a snapshot of the contenders. It will also touch on the South's concern about Republican efforts to allow, "preferred banking and corporate interests" to have undue influence within the federal government.

Bits and Pieces #19: YOU CAN'T MAKE THIS STUFF UP

In the final scene in the classic movie, The Bridge on the River Kwai, British officer, Major Clipton, looks over the carnage of the destroyed train and the dead bodies lying about and utters the immortal line,

"Madness. Madness." Well, it looks like we too are approaching the closing scene in our own movie. I look at many of the things going on around this country and all I can utter is, "Madness." Let's look at some of the things that should cause each of us to pause and think about who we elect to run this

1. Senate Bill S. 3589: Look it up. This bill introduced by Senator Ed Markey (D-MA), no surprise there, is titled "Preventing Private Paramilitary Activity Act of 2024." At first glance, one might suppose this makes total sense. The idea of paramilitary groups running amok inside the country is a possible reason for concern. The long title of this bill is "Prohibition of **Unauthorized Private Paramilitary Activity.**"

This bill goes on to define things like ammunition, armed forces, dangerous weapons, firearms, large capacity ammunition feeding device and others. It then defines a private paramilitary organization as "any group of three or more persons associating under a command structure for the purpose of functioning in public or training to function in public as a combat support, law enforcement, or security services unit."

Section 2742 says, "it shall be unlawful to knowingly, in a circumstance described in subsection (b), while acting as part of or on behalf of a private paramilitary organization and armed with a firearm, explosive or incendiary device, or other dangerous weapon. There is much more to this bill to include some exceptions to the overall rules. But if you ask me what my point might be, I will tell you that when you look at this bill, there is one group of people who are placed squarely in the crosshairs of this bill - - Church security teams.

When you read the bill in its entirety, church security teams fit this broad definition of being paramilitary organizations 100%. Simple. Did Senator Markey intend for this to be the case? Who knows but he is a progressive lib so we can guess where his head is situated. If you read through the bill it gets worse. The definitions are so broad that many people, even those who simply want to train together, can now be classified as paramilitary organizations. And if you happen to train with people (i.e. go to the gun range together) and happen to violate this bill, under section (d), you can be fined, imprisoned for not more than one year or both. If damage to property occurs the fine still applies but jail time can go up to two years. Bodily injury will get you up to five years while killing another person can result in possibly life in prison.

So, here is the scenario. Like in Joel Osteen's church last month, a shooter comes into the church and starts shooting. You step in and do the right thing, killing the bad guy/ girl. Under this bill, since you are technically a member of a paramilitary organization, you get to go to jail. What about a knife-wielding attacker who has just raped a little kid in the nursery and is holding another one at knife point. Boom. Off to hell the bad guy goes and then off to jail you go. Again, according to Markey, church security teams are a paramilitary organization, a threat to the nation and this country doesn't need people like them.

Fortunately, there are several exceptions listed. Unfortunately, not one of them would even come close to covering a church security team acting to save the lives of its people. And to be honest, folks, there are shootings or other acts of violence committed in churches nearly every week. The only exceptions to this bill are the armed forces of the US, National Guard or militia called up by the state, a group of individuals "who associate for the purpose of historical reenactment or parade in public as a "bona fide" veterans organization," "students in an educational institution authorized by the Federal Government or a State that teaches military science" and lastly, "members of an organization that is authorized under federal or state law to provide paramilitary, law enforcement, or security services training or to engage in paramilitary activity, law enforcement, or security services when performing the functions authorized by law and, in the case of paramilitary activity and law enforcement functions, when under the direction and control of a governmental authority." As you can see, your local church security team is not covered.

Why would a progressive, liberal democrat want to hinder American's rights and the opportunity to save innocent lives? Well, because he is a liberal, progressive democrat and it seems as though many progressives cannot help thinking outside of their own doctrinal blindness. In all fairness, both sides can be guilty of this. But like I said previously, I have no idea whether the

International automakers play a pivotal role in Alabama's economy, contributing significantly to job creation, economic growth, and community development. These employers provide \$72 billion annually in federal, state, and local tax revenue that

helps pay for essential public services. These companies, like Hyundai provide good-paying jobs with benefits that on average cover 90% of health care premiums for workers without unions. The downstream effects of these quality jobs have contributed immeasurably to Central Alabama's economic growth.

The UAW's aggressive campaign to unionize Alabama's international automaking workers poses a threat to the very essence of workplace freedom and economic prosperity that initially made Alabama such an attractive place to set up shop. Make no mistake. I support the hard-earned right of every worker to decide if joining the union is right for them. But the UAW's campaign impinges on that right in creative and cynical ways.

This method exposes employees to undue pressure, coercion, and intimidation. Furthermore, the **UAW** and its political allies intend to restrict and police the flow of information to workers. "Neutrality agreements" are being coerced upon employers, preventing them from discussing the potential drawbacks of unionization with workers, effectively silencing employers' First Amendment rights. What Is The Effect Of The Recent **Alabama Supreme Court Ruling** On In Vitro Fertilized Embryos?

In December 2020, a patient of Mobile (AL) Infirmary managed to gain access through an unsecure entry to the cyrogenic nursery at the Center for Reproductive Health (Center). The patient picked up some embryos belonging to at least three couples which had been fertilized between 2013 and 2016. Because the

embryos were frozen and stored in the nursery when they were a few days old, the subzero temperature caused a burning of the patient's hands and they dropped the embryos to the floor. Though some of the fertilized eggs had been previously implanted and resulted in live births, those stored that were dropped had thawed before they were found and resulted in them no longer being viable for implantation. Many in the press writing of this occurrence called it an

accident, which it was somewhat, but in doing so made the act of theft and

destruction of these extrauterine lives as something almost trivial.

Two of the couples brought a joined claim against the Center with a third couple bringing a separate claim. Each claim asserted claims under the Alabama Wrongful Death of a Minor Act. In the alternative, should the Court find the embryos as property rather than as children, there were various claims of negligence or in the case of the sole couple negligence and wantoness. The claims also included compensatory damages, mental anguish, emotional distress and the solo couple also included breach of contract.

At trial the Court held that the embryos were not living children and due to other legal reasons no legal theory was actionable with the exception of the solo couple's breach of contract claim. Though not a part of the opinion, the prior Roe v Wade case had supported that a child that could not survive outside of the womb to not be a viable person. Both sides appealed.

The Alabama Supreme Court held that the deaths of the embryos do fall under the Alabama Wrongful Death of a Minor Act. The majority opinion held, "All parties to these cases, like all members of this Court, agree that an unborn child is a genetically unique human being whose life begins at fertilization and ends at death. The parties further agree that an unborn child usually qualifies as a "human life," "human being," or "person," as those words are used in ordinary conversation and in the text of Alabama's wrongful-death statutes. That is true, as everyone acknowledges, throughout all stages of an unborn child's development, regardless of viability.


The question on which the parties disagree is whether there exists an un-written exception to that rule for unborn children who are not physically located "in utero" -- that is, inside a biological uterus -- at the time they are killed. The defendants argue that this Court should recognize such an exception because, they say, an unborn child ceases to qualify as a "child or "person" if that child is not contained within a biological womb. The Act defines life at the moment of conception and ends at death. It has been long held that the wrongful death of a minor occurs even from a criminal or negligent act resulting in the death of a minor."

President Biden and the "pro-choice" contingent decry this as a result of the overturn of Roe v Wade. Roe v Wade was never built on sound Constitutional law and instead built on what the late Pastor Harry Reeder of Birmingham called a "culture of death".

human life rashly, and for no purpose. Men are indeed unworthy of God's care, if respect be had only to themselves; but since

The IVF community has however heightened awareness when each fertilized egg forms a human embryo. In Alabama, in the past there have been six basic uses of embryos. Not included are those eggs without successful fertilization and can never be viable. Those embryos, one or more that survive may be chosen to be implanted into a woman's uterus in hopes of a pregnancy that makes it to term or viability and produces a healthy infant. The other five choices are for those embryos not immediately implanted, that being for (1) donation to another couple having fertility issues, (2) donation to research, (3) compassionate transfer which is the implantation of the embryo into the mother's uterus at a cyclical time when implantation and growth will likely not continue to occur, (4) the removal of the embryo from the cryogenic nursery where it is allowed to die and placed in medical waste and (5) storing the embryos almost indefinitely. I think that research and placing unwanted embryos in medical waste are the equivalent of the abortionist culture of death. But in a situation where maybe dozens of eggs are removed in an attempt at fertilization and maybe half of those are successful what do you do after successfully and unsuccessfully implanting maybe 8-10 of those and still have maybe 15-20 remaining? Even donation can be a dilemma when you consider giving away your future children that may look like you and have personality traits like you. Even with compassionate transfer where you know this tiny life will likely not survive due to being implanted at a less desireable time in the mother's ovulation cycle. But there have been cases of healthy deliveries of implanted compassionate transfers in which God chose that the embryo lived.

IVF is an incredible possibility for a couple having their own child after natural conception has failed for whatever reason(s) after a period of at least a year. Even morally one wonders about a lab conceiving your child and giving the child their choice of genetics, even leaving open the possibility of future review of an embryo that may have less than desireable genetic makeup due to the medical history of the couple. The Bible tells us that man is made in God's image and one must wonder where science begins to play God.

SLASH TAXES TO 1% -- **REALLY?**

Here's a tax reduction proposal everyone should love:

- No tax at all on your first \$95,000 income
- (\$125,000 if filing jointly) 1% tax on income above \$95,000
- (or \$125,000 if filing jointly) An extra 1% super-tax for those making more
- than \$600,000 per year
- The super-tax increases to 6% for those making \$16 million per year.

Too good to be true? Maybe it is -- today. But that's the tax we had in 1913, the year the 16th Amendment was adopted. The first IRS Form 1040 exempted all income below \$3,000 (\$95,000 in 2024 money). Out of a population of 97 million, only 358,000 had to file a return.

You ask, how could the federal government function on so small a budget? The answer is, the federal government was limited in scope, for the most part, to those powers delegated to it by the people through Article I, Section 8 of the Constitution. George Washington began his administration in 1789 with only 350 federal civilian employees. That number had grown to 388,000 by 1913, but that's only a fraction of the approximately 3,000,000 federal civilian employees today – and that's not including postal employees, active and reserve military personnel, and state and local employees.

Monsters have to be fed, and Big Government requires money to fuel it. The income tax authorized by the Sixteenth Amendment is the mechanism that produces the fuel to feed the bureaucracy. In contrast to 1913, the average person today pays about 13.3% of his net income in federal income tax. But that's only federal income tax. Add to that Social Security, Medicare, plus state and local income tax, sales tax, gas tax, property tax, and more, and government takes about 28.4% of the average person's income. That means we spend a good portion of the year working just to pay our taxes to government at all levels, and only after that has been paid is the money we earn truly our own.

Florida businessman Dallas Hostetler developed the concept of Tax Freedom Day, the day the average citizen has worked long enough to pay his taxes and may now start to earn money for himself. As government has grown, and the portion of our payroll we can keep for ourselves has shrunk, Tax Freedom Day has moved later and later on the calendar.

In 1910, before the federal income tax, government consumed 5% of our income, so Tax Freedom Day was January 19. Most of that 5% was at the state and local level. Robert Nisbet has observed that no one who lived before 1913 can really understand the nature of traditional American freedom, under which one could live almost one's entire life without contact with the federal government. April 15 was just another day on the calendar. By 1920, after the income tax came into effect and after the budget was increased to finance World War I, government consumed 12% of the average person's income, so Tax Freedom Day had to be moved to February 13.

The New Deal programs of the 1930s greatly increased the size and scope of government, and taxes were needed to pay for those programs. So our tax burden increased to 17.9% by 1940, and Tax Freedom Day became March 7. The welfare state grew after World War II and taxes consumed 30.4% of our income in 1980, so Taxpayer Freedom Day became April 21. President Reagan held the line on federal growth but did not decrease it as much as he had hoped.

The answer is, nowhere. The student loan programs should never have been started.

All public officials, elected or appointed, take an oath to support and defend the Constitution of the United States. We need to remind them that the Tenth Amendment is part of the Constitution they have sworn to uphold, and we will not vote for them unless they promise to follow the Constitution as they perform their duties.



Alabama Legislature Holds **Military Appreciation Day**

On Tuesday the Alabama Legislature held a joint session in House chambers to honor America's military and salute active-duty military members, the reserves, veterans, and their families.

"It was a privilege to honor Alabama's men and women in uniform during a joint session of the Alabama Legislature," said Speaker of the House Nathaniel

Ledbetter (R-Rainsville) on the social media platform X. "Those who answered the call to serve our country represent the very best of us. Without them, there is no American dream." "The courageous men and women who serve in our military sacrifice so much to ensure our freedoms, safety, and prosperity," said Senate President Pro Tem.

Greg Reed (R-Jasper) on X. "They stand ready to answer the call whenever

that may be, and it was a privilege to honor them today at Military Appreciation

Day in the Statehouse."

The Lieutenant Governor Chairs the Alabama Military Stability Commission. Formed in 2011 by a resolution of the Alabama Legislature and signed by the Governor. The Commission is tasked with protecting and promoting the federal military presence in Alabama, which has a significant economic impact.

"Among my most important duties as Lieutenant Governor is serving the needs of active military members and veterans," said Lt. Gov. Ainsworth on X. "The legislature had the opportunity today to show our appreciation of active military members, veterans, and their families for their sacrifice and dedication."

Among the dignitaries on hand for the event was U.S. Air Force Lt. General Air Force Heath Collins - the Director of the Missile Defense Agency, which is headquartered in Huntsville's Redstone Arsenal.

"I am humbled and honored by our mission to provide the layered missile defenses that protect our United States," said Gen. Collins. "The Von Braun complex on Redstone Arsenal is the hub of missile defense agency operations, our largest of four major MDA locations we have around the nation. It is the center of gravity for a critical mission."

Colonel Alan Richardson is the commander of Maxwell Air Force Base in Montgomery.

"We are in the fight for you every day and we are very proud that you are in the fight for us," said Col. Collins.

Alabama Governor Kay Ivey recently appointed Gen. Gen. David Pritchett as

the head of the Alabama National Guard. Gen. Pritchett said that in today's recruiting environment it is very difficult for

the armed forces to meet its recruitment goals; but that the Alabama National Guard has met and exceeded its goal last year by 500.

The Legislature has passed a number of pieces of legislation over the past seven years recommended by the Military Stability Commission to make Alabama more friendly to active-duty military families and to strengthen the state's position in the next phase of base realignments and closures.

The Alabama Republican party runoff and the Alabama Democratic party runoff are both coming up on April 16. There are a number of races on the ballot across Alabama; but none bigger than in Alabama's Second Congressional District.

This year, the state of Alabama has a rare open congressional election with no incumbent. The new Congressional District 2 was created by the federal court to make the district much more likely that the choice of minority voters is ultimately elected to Congress. Congressman Barry Moore (R-Enterprise) who had represented CD2 was redistricted into Jerry Carl's (R-Mobile)

CD1; while most of the voters in Carl's native Mobile County were rezoned into CD2. The redistricting split Mobile County, the Wiregrass, and the River Region. Moore subsequently defeated Carl in the Republican primary on March 5. The Court ordered redistricting in September opened up CD2 for a congressional newcomer.

Approximately 20 candidates were running for the Republican and Democratic primaries – far too many for any to win without a runoff. The runoffs are both on April 16.

Former Deputy Attorney General Shomari Figures faces Alabama House Minority Leader Anthony Daniels (D-Huntsville) in the Democratic primary runoff.



Figures is a native of Mobile; but has spent the last decade serving in a number of roles, most recently in the Biden Justice Department. Figures is the son of State Senator Vivian Figures and the late Sen. Michael Figures. Figures and his wife have two children.

"Young people are not just the future of our democracy, they're what our democracy needs right now," Figures said on Facebook. "District 2 is home to over a dozen public and

private colleges and universities, and in Congress I will fight for the issues that impact our schools, students, faculty and staff – including ensuring that our institutions have the resources necessary to thrive and that students are not priced out of a college degree or spend their lives paying for it."



Daniels is a native of Bullock County; but he has spent most of his adult life in Madison County, where he went to college, representing the people of Huntsville in the Alabama House of Representatives. He is the first Black minority leader in the history of the Alabama House of Representatives. He is also the youngest person to ever hold that position. Daniels and his wife have three children.

"I realized it was my time to start planting seeds for others to succeed," said Daniels. "In 2014 I was elected to the House of Representatives and chosen by my colleagues to be minority leader." "It put me in position to steer hundreds of millions of dollars to the seventh congressional district."

"I know what it takes to make a difference," Daniels said. "I've always represented you. I worked across the aisle to lower drug costs. I am leading the fight to expand Medicaid." It is time that we have one of us representing us in Congress." Daniels added

On the Republican side, former State Senator Dick Brewbaker (R-Montgomery) faces real estate attorney Caroleene Dobson.



Brewbaker is a Montgomery native and a former automobile dealer. He has represented the greater Montgomery area in both the Alabama House and Senate. After two terms in the Alabama Senate representing District 25. He did not seek reelection because of a term limits promise that he made to the voters. Brewbaker is a father and grandfather.

"You have got to have someone with some kind of a record to get the remaining swing voters," said Brewbaker in

a recent radio interview with Jeff Poor. "It is very winnable for a Republican."

"In the general election, if Republican don't win the Second District, it will be because Democrats did a better job of turning their vote out," said Brewbaker. "Regular people are concerned about the border. They are concerned about inflation. The economy is softening and they are worried about their own safety and are worried about their kids. They want representatives in Congress who will take this issues and work to solve them and not use it as a punching line."



Caroleene Dobson grew up on a cattle farm in Beatrice, Alabama. Growing up she excelled in rodeo growing up and was a national merit finalist. She practices law for a law firm in Birmingham and serves on the Alabama Forestry Commission and Southeast Livestock Exposition Board. She and her husband have two children.

"I am running to fight for Alabama families to ensure that we have more good paying jobs," said Dobson in a Face-

book message. "As your Congresswoman for District 2, I will focus on cutting spending and balancing the budget. Year after year there are threats of government shutdowns because we don't balance our budget. We've got to be more responsible in our spending."

The winners of the two runoffs will represent their respective parties on the November 5 general election.

Polls will open on Tuesday at 7:00 a.m. and close at 7:00 p.m. Voters must vote at their assigned polling place and must have a valid photo ID in their possession to participate in any Alabama election. If you do not have a valid photo ID, you may obtain a free voter ID from your Board of Registrars or the Alabama Secretary of State's office.

Given the historically narrow partisan divide in the U.S. House of Representatives, this congressional election in Alabama will go a long way towards deciding which party controls the House. Whether the next President is Trump or Biden, if the other party controls the House of Representatives much of the President's legislative agenda would be effectively thwarted.

Elon vs the UAW

Nearly everybody knows that Elon Musk does not like unions—just like he does not like oppressive big government and other violators of free markets and individual liberty. Although purported to be enforcers of fair wages and safe working environments, unions tend to be invasive, coercive, and sometimes criminal. The United Auto Workers is one of them.

There is no question that the UAW is lusting to get its meat hooks onto America's newest, greatest, most prosperous, and most valuable automobile company—Tesla. Its happy well-paid workers (with very few exceptions) are very satisfied making fine cars in spotless new high tech factories without the hassles of union dues, arguments with union bosses, calling new workers "scabs," and being begged to go on strikes and spend hours carrying picket signs in the cold rain.

Columnist Matt Hardigree wrote, "Elon Musk garners little affection from the left-wing arm of the labor movement (and the Democratic Party) that's come in to help support the UAW's leadership." But WHAT "leadership"?

In just about every case, any company is better off without union intrusion or government intervention. It is free to offer reasonable wages and hire the people that it chooses. On the other hand, workers can accept or refuse the wages and environments offered. Somewhere in the middle, the law of supply and demand will settle disputes and disagreements without any need for meddling from outsiders. This translates into greater productivity, better products, and lower costs and prices.

There is no need to go on strike. If a worker is unhappy for any reason, he can quit and seek employment elsewhere. If a worker fails to adequately perform, the company can fire him, or perhaps pay a lower wage. But NOBODY has a right to coerce a company or its workers.

In the past, Musk actually invited the UAW to come to his Fremont, CA factory and hold a union election among his employees, already knowing that they would say, "NO." Even former UAW members rejected the offer.

Tesla workers earn from \$22 up to \$39 per hour while Ford and GM workers get from \$25.25 up to \$36. UAW's president Shawn Fain claimed that Tesla's pay is "pitiful," that workers are just getting by, so that "greedy people like Elon Musk can build more rocket ships." But Tesla offers stock options, and Musk has openly stated, "Quite a few of our factory techs who work on the line have become millionaires." That one item alone is worth far more than any benefits a union could ever hope to offer.

There is no worker shortage. Even though Tesla requires its employees to produce with minimal "goofing off," the desire to be part of the world's most advanced and fastest growing automobile manufacturer is overwhelming. In 2022 alone, over 3.6 million people applied for work at Tesla—25.7 times its entire global work force. A Fremont factory worker said, "People are proud of what they do here. They believe in the mission of the company."

Today, Tesla has 20,000 workers at Fremont and 140,000 worldwide.

When unions find businesses that are reluctant to accept their "offers," they hire spies to apply for jobs at them and seek out strategies to entice the workers to adopt the "benefits" of becoming unionized. To get a foot in the door, they must coerce at least 30% of the workers to be willing to join. The union holds an election, and if it gets the needed 30% approval, it has a shot to take over the company

But the company can resist. Sometimes it wins and remains unscathed. Sometimes it loses to the union, and the union begins demanding higher pay and other benefits. The workers enjoy these perks for a while, but the company's profits diminish. For a while, the company can survive, but as the union's workers demand more and more, and the profit pie diminishes to a breaking point, the company is forced to shut down, and *EVERYBODY* loses his job and his benefits. The company could either go bankrupt or relocate to a more business-friendly environment, far away from the hostile unemployed workers and the union's tentacles.

A perfect example of a train wreck caused largely by the UAW is Detroit, often called "Motown." In its heyday, it was the automobile capital of the world. Look at it today. The automobile manufacturers that survived bankruptcy have fled to other states and other countries.

In Europe, millions of workers have recently erupted for several months in the United Kingdom, France, Germany and Spain, causing considerable mayhem.

Fortunately, U.S. unrest is at a low ebb. Union memberships across the board have diminished, including the UAW. They have plummeted from about 33% in the 1950's to 10% today. People have become wiser and wiser about the corruption and devastation they have wrought in the past. They have learned that getting too greedy for higher wages has killed the geese that used to lay their golden eggs.

Today, according to the Hamilton Project, the U.S. has one of the lowest union

memberships among industrialized nations, a striking contrast to the days of violent demonstrations and brawls decades ago. However, we still suffer from public-sector unions. Their membership rate is 33.1 percent—more than five times the 6 percent rate at the private-sector. Massive, excessive government expansion is largely to blame. The highest memberships include firefighters and police officers (34.6%) and teachers (33.7%).

Alabama, along with former union strongholds (Michigan, Wisconsin and Indiana) are now fortunate to be blessed with right to work laws that prohibit compulsory union membership. Today, 30% of America's 14.3 million union members remain in California (2.6 million) and New York (1.7 million).

On Quora, Seth Chazanoff had this to say: "The way that unions operate in the United States if you are in management, you have to be crazy to want to have a union in your company.

"Unions will promise to increase wages and benefits from whatever the baseline is, while protecting non-productive workers. They typically drive down productivity, since merit based raises go away in favor of raises across the board."

Seth recalled "a small company about 30 years ago" that hosted barbecues for

its employees on Friday afternoons while still "on the clock." They were very popular. A union tried to sue the company to stop them, claiming they were "unfair labor practices." As a result, the employees flatly refused to join the union.

How well do Tesla's employees like their CEO, Elon Musk? Workplace culture website, Comparably, recently released the results from its 2018 Best

CEO Awards from over 10 million ratings collected from more than 50,000 companies via employees' anonymous votes from November 26, 2017, through November 26, 2018.

At both SpaceX and Tesla, Elon's employees ranked him "among the best CEO in the United States". They proised him for him "among the best certain the United States". They proised him for him "among the best certain the United States".

CEOs in the United States." They praised him for his "can do" attitude and his dedication to his work, right down to sometimes working 22 hour days and sleeping on the factory floor. When asked by a Twitter user how much he needed to work to change the world, Musk replied that around 80 hours a week were necessary.

Musk strives to be part of every decision his companies make. When testing a risky new part of an autopilot feature in a Tesla, he personally became a living test dummy to back up his argument.

Thomas Sowell says it in a nutshell: "The most fundamental fact about labor unions is they do not create any wealth. They are among a growing number of institutions that specialize in siphoning off wealth created by others.... Unions are for unions, just as corporations are for corporations, and politicians are for politicians. Nothing shows the utter cynicism of the unions and the politicians who do their bidding like the so-called Employee Free Choice Act, like the Obama administration tried to push through Congress. Workers' free choice as to whether or not to join a union is precisely what that legislation would destroy.... The actions of union mobs in Wisconsin, Ohio, and elsewhere give us a free home demonstration of how unions respect the rights of those who disagree with them, and how much they rely on harassment and threats to get what they want.... At one time, US Steel was the largest steel producer in the world, and General Motors the largest automobile manufacturer. No more. Their unions were riding high in their heyday, but they too discovered there was no free lunch as their members lost jobs by the hundreds of thousands. Workers have also learned there is no free lunch, which is why over the years, they have voted against unions in secret ballot elections."

Of course Elon Musk does not like unions. He already knows they come with grave consequences.

This is one of the ethics that made Musk the greatest entrepreneur in history.

- Get a Social Security tax form (1099/1042S).
- Opt out of receiving certain notices by mail and receive them in the secure Message Center.

HOW TO SPOT AN IMPOSTER SOCIAL MEDIA ACCOUNT

Want to learn how to spot fake Social Security social media accounts? The tips below will help you protect yourself and your family.

How fraudsters create imposter accounts

Fraudsters create imposter social media pages and accounts using Social Security-related images and vocabulary, making them appear as if they're associated with or endorsed by us. They also create imposter social media pages of Social Security and OIG officials, such as the Commissioner or the Inspector General.

Protect your personally identifiable information

We will never ask for sensitive information through social media as these channels are not secure. Sometimes, users are asked to enter their financial information, Social Security number (SSN), or other sensitive information. This is a red flag, and often an indication of a fraudulent account.

How to spot a fake social media account

Identifying an imposter account may seem difficult at first, but there are a few things you can look for right away. You will want to focus on the following:

- How many people follow the imposter page. In most cases, fake pages have a very low number of followers as compared to Social Security's official page.
- Improper punctuation.
- Links to pages not on SSA.gov.
- Advertisements for forms or other Social Security documents for a price.
- Incorrect social media handles. To view the list of our official social media channels, we encourage you to visit www.ssa.gov/socialmedia.




Sheriff Cuningham believes IGNITE will provide former inmates with the necessary tools to succeed in our community.

AHERO: America's Heroes **Enjoying Recreation Outdoors**



AHERO (America's Heroes Enjoying Recreation Outdoors) connects Veterans with patriotic members and first responders of local communities by organizing outdoor events and social activities. Its goal is to heal the physical and psychological wounds of war and military service by: (1) Introducing Veterans to resources and programs available to them to increase their overall quality of life, (2) Developing an informal support network of Veterans across the country. (3) Encouraging constructive communication and engagement and (4) Boosting morale. AHERO helps veterans and first responders using its Four Pillars-Physical, Financial, Emotional, and Spiritual. By connecting with its participants and addressing all four areas instead of one, they can walk away from its events and programs with valuable resources and tools that help as a whole and not just a part.

AHERO was organized and is operated by OIF and OEF Marine Corps and Army Veterans who understand the challenges today's war veterans face in reengaging the civilian world. Approximately 94-98% of all donated funds go back to the service members and Veterans in the form of program development, support and execution. AHERO has no paid staff members, and it keeps its overhead and administrative costs to between three and six percent of funds raised on an annual basis.

AHERO was conceived and founded by Major Lee Stuckey who served in the U.S. Marine Corps. Maj Stuckey served three combat tours in Iraq. Maj Stuckey was awarded the Purple Heart for wounds received in Iraq, Bronze Star, Navy and Marine Corps Commendation Medal with a "V" device for Actions of Valor during combat, Outstanding Volunteer Service Medal, Combat Action Ribbon and other military rib-



bons/medals for outstanding service. Maj Stuckey suffered a brain injury from an Improvised Explosive Device (IED) in 2007. Lee's brain injury and coupled with the emotional trauma of several combat deployments, he was led to the edge of suicide. Lee was tired of dealing with the nightmares and stress and put a gun to his head. As he was pulling the trigger, his cell phone rang and displayed the word "Mom." He immediately dropped the pistol and realized he needed help. As a Marine Corps Officer, Maj Stuckey realized that if he was struggling with psychological issues, thousands of American veterans must be silently suffering in similar ways. Lee began to visit Walter Reed Hospital and other military hospitals across the country and connected with the servicemen and women that he met at these facilities. He was deeply affected by the severity of the physical and emotional injuries that so many servicemen and women had endured. Approximately 22 Veterans a day are committing suicide to put the yearly average at a horrific 8,030 a year. Maj Stuckey's new mission was to lower these numbers by sharing his story and reaching as many veterans as possible before it was too late.



AHERO is a veterans organization whose purpose is to serve America's wounded veterans by providing fellowship and mentoring opportunities through outdoor activities. All 100% of donations go to the veterans. Nothing goes to administration or salaries.

Col John William Schmidt: Age 76





Col John William Schmidt served 26 years in the U.S. Marine Corps. His Military Occupational Specialty (MOS) included: (1) Infantry Officer for 24 years and seven months, (2) Ground Officer, Colonel, three years one month and (3) Public Affairs Office, 11 years two months. Col Schmidt participated in Operations Against Viet Cong Forces in the Republic of Vietnam (RVN) and in Operation Desert Shield/Storm. This valiant Marine received the following medals, badges, citations and campaign ribbons: Legion of Merit with one Gold Star, Bronze Star, Defense Meritorious Service Medal, Meritorious Service Medal, Joint Service Commendation, Navy Commendation with Combat "V", Navy Achieve-

ment Medal with one Gold Star, Combat Acton Ribbon, Joint Meritorious Unit Award, Meritorious Unit Commendation with one Star, National Defense Service Medal with one Star, Vietnam Service Medal with two Stars, Southwest Asia Service Medal with three Stars, Humanitarian Service Medal, Sea Service Deployment Ribbon with three Stars, Republic of Vietnam Gallantry Cross Unit Citation, Republic of Vietnam Campaign Medal and Kuwait Liberation Medal.

Col Schmidt was born June 26, 1947 to his parents, Harold and Margaret Schmidt, at Menasha, WI. His father served in the U.S. Army during WWII. His family moved to Birmingham, AL, where he was reared and where he graduated from John Carroll High School in 1965. He graduated from Alabama College which is now the University of Montevallo in 1969 with a BA Degree in Political Science.

Having participated in the Platoon Leadership program in college, he joined the U.S. Marine Corps as a 2nd Lt. June 3, 1969. He completed six months of training at the Marine Basic School at the Marine Base Quantico, VA. His first MOS was Infantry Officer, and his first assignment was deployment to Camp Hansan, Okinawa, Japan, with the 3rd Marine Division in June 1971 for five months followed by service for five months at Vietnam with the 1st Marine Division where he served in combat. Next, he served at Camp Pendleton, CA, still with the 1st Marine Division from June 1971 to September 1972. He earned a Master's Degree in Journalism and Mass Communication from the University of Wisconsin in 1973. Then he served at the Marine Headquarters at Washington, D.C. in Public Affairs 1973-1977. While in this capacity, Col chmidt helped to implement the Freedom of Information Act for the Defense Department. In May 1977, he returned to Birmingham, AL, and served with the Marine Reserve with the 4th Battalion Marines while working at the University of AL at Birmingham, Al, for one year.

Col Schmidt returned to Active duty serving as the Infantry Officer with the 1st Marine Division at Camp Pendleton 1978-1979. He then served as the Public Affairs Officer at Camp LeJeune 1979-1987. While there, he served as the

primary spokesman for the Vietnam War POW PFC Robert Garwood who stood trial for AWOL desertion at Vietnam. This was the first televised court-martial for the U.S. military. He returned for a second deployment to Okinawa. Then he served for two years at the Marine Aircraft Group-26 at New River, N.C. Completing his tour at New River, he was assigned commanding officer of a logistics unit with the 22d Marine Expeditionary Unit. He next deployed for sea duty in the Mediterranean Sea 1987-1989 serving aboard the USS Shreveport (LPD-12), an Austin-class amphibious transport dock and the USS Nassau, (LHA-4) a Tarawa-class amphibious assault ship. In 1989, he completed the program at the U.S. Air Force War College at Maxwell AFB, AL. In 1989-1990, he served with the US Central Command (CentCom) at Tampa, FL. He was deployed to Saudia Arabia in 1990 after the invasion of Kuwait by Iraq. He served as the Operations Officer there during Desert Shield and Desert Storm where he planned defense and offense operations until April 1991. He served in Kuwait August 1990-June 1992.

Col Schmidt then served at Camp LeJeune, and he was involved with the Marines' assistance to people affected by Hurricane Andrew in Florida. Next, in February, 1993, he commanded the Special Purpose Marine Air Ground Force on the aircraft carrier, USS Theodore Roosevelt, for six months off the coast of Saudia Arabia. One of the missions was to rescue downed pilots. He commanded another Special Purpose Marine Air Ground Task Force aboard the USS Nassau off the coast of Haiti in August 1993-December 1993. Col Schmidt retired from all military service October 31,1994.



After military retirement, Col Schmidt received an EdD Degree in Higher Education from Nova University. He worked for 20 years during 1994-2014 with Troy University. He served in leadership positions as the Executive Assistant to the Chancellor, Vice President for Advancement with fund raising, Vice Chancellor for Student Affairs and Senior Vice President for Student Affairs. While there, he created a Student Service Center to inspire retention. From 2018-2021, he worked as Senior Vice Chancellor for Student Services Administration.

Col Schmidt and his wife, Vickie, have been married 52 years, and they have three sons and five grandchildren. He is a life-time member of the Marine Corps League and a member of Holy Spirit Catholic Church and the Board of Trustees of the American Village. He has served as President of the Troy Rotary Club. For recreation, he enjoys exercise, reading and fishing.

Col Schmidt's conclusions about what serving in the Marines means to him are: "Give back to this great nation. What this great nation gave to me was love of country and family." He would like people to remember him as a man who loved the Marine Corps.



Col Denny Rea: Age 70





On September 11, 2001, Col Denny Rea was stationed at Luke Air Force Base, AZ, as the commander in charge of 10,000 US Air Force personnel while the Wing commander was away, as the disastrous events of that day unfolded on the east coast. He saw his teams react as they had been trained which was to load aircraft with weapons, fly 24-hour air patrols over the southwestern United States, work with the City of Glendale for local security, rapidly set-up an off-base dispensary for life-saving medications for the elderly in the turmoil, coordinate with the North American Defense (NORAD) command for national directives and

work with the FBI's anti-terrorism task force to prevent further incidents or damage. Col Rea states, "This was a sober time, but one of the culminations of a career in military service that made me proud."

Colonel Denny Rea served 30 years in the U.S. Air Force. His Air Force Service Code (AFSC) included: (1) Command Fighter Pilot for 25 years, (2) OPS Commander for two years and (3) Academic Program Manager for three years. Among his awards were the following: Legion of Merit with oak leaf cluster (OLC), Meritorious Service Medal with four OLCs, Meritorious Unit Award with two OLCs, AF Outstanding Unit Award, Air Force Organizational Excellence Award, Air Medal with OLC, Aerial Achievement Medal with three OLCs, Combat Readiness Medal with three OLCs, National Defense Service Medal with Service Star, Southwest Asia Service Medal with Service Star, Global War on Terrorism Service Medal and the Humanitarian Service Medal.

Col Rea was born January 1954 in Austin, TX, to his parents, Jim and Ann Rea. His father served as a P-47 pilot during WWII in the Pacific Theater. Col Rea was active in the Boy Scouts and earned the rank of Eagle Scout and was a member of the Order of the Arrow. In high school, Col Rea played football, ran track and played in the concert and jazz bands. He graduated from Stephen F. Austin High School in 1972.

Col Rea entered the U.S. Air Force Academy July 3, 1972, ran intercollegiate hurdles in track, completed U.S. and British parachute jump schools and the Air Force Survival School and qualified in the T-41 aircraft. He graduated on June 2, 1976, with a BS Degree in Management and was commissioned as a 2nd Lt. in the U.S. Air Force.

Col Rea's active-duty military service began with pilot training at Vance Air Force Base (AFB), OK from 1976-1977. His assignments included: (1) Holloman AFB, NM, for fighter lead-in training, 1977, (2) MacDill AFB, FL, for F-4D fighter training, 1978, (3) Kunsan AB, Korea, as an operational F-4D fighter pilot & flight lead, 1978-1979, (4) Nellis AFB, NV, as an F-4D and then F-16A flight lead, instructor, test pilot and flight evaluator, 1979-1983, (5) Luke AFB, AZ, as an F-16A instructor pilot, flight evaluator and flight commander, 1983-1987, (6) Randolph AFB, TX, on the Fighter Personnel Assignments staff, 1987-1990, (7) Maxwell AFB, AL, Air Command & Staff College, 1990-1991, (8) Spangdahlem AB, Germany, as an F-16C Operations Officer and Squadron Commander, 1991-1997, (9) Tucson AFB, AZ, 12th Air Force Inspector General Director of Inspections, 1997-1999, (10) Mountain Home AFB, ID, Operations Group Commander 1999-2000, Kusan AB, Korea, F16C Wing Vice Commander, 2000-2001, (11) Luke AB, AZ, F16C Wing Vice Commander, 2001-2003, and (12) Maxwell AFB, AL, as an Air War College Associate Professor and Command Chair for Air Combat Command, 2003-2006.

Col Rea's 30-year military service spanned across all major theaters of operation. He completed two remote tours in Korea and spent over five combined years in Europe and the Middle East. While serving, Col Rea earned a Master of Business Administration degree from Golden Gate University and graduated from Professional Military Education (PME) courses including Squadron Officer School, Air Command and Staff College and the Air War College. He also completed the Nuclear Instructors Course at Sandia Laboratories, USAF Europe Commanders Course, Senior Commander Leadership Training, Senior Leaders Maintenance Course, and the USAF Accident Board President Course.

Col Rea served as the Director of Inspections for the 12th Air Force Inspector General, commanded America's only true composite flying group with B-1, KC-

135, F-15A, F-15C and F-16C aircraft & maintenance teams, as the Air University Command Chair for the Air Combat Command where he instructed at the Air War College and led two senior officer delegations to the People's Republic of China. Col Rea completed his military career with 3,500 fighter hours including 300 combat hours over Iraq and Bosnia. Col Rea retired from military service in 2006.

Col Rea then worked as a Senior Project Manager and Consultant for 17 years primarily in the "learning technology" industry upgrading federal government training courses to interactive and immersive learning methods in new modalities. These efforts enhanced the progress by the younger generations who are "wired" to learn by interactivity, digital awareness, and online situational problem solving vs. his generation's reading and highlighting books or PowerPoint briefings.

Col Rea worked 10 years for Vertex Solutions which was later named Adayana and based out of Falls Church, VA. His projects included creating innovative learning products for AETC agencies such as the Culture & Language Center and the Air Force Negotiation Center of Excellence at Maxwell AFB, developing a "Future of Learning" blueprint for HQ AETC, creating voice-activated situational courses for the Defense Language Institute and developing interactive virtual scenarios for the Department of Defense Fire Academy. He also directed projects to develop e-learning courses for the U.S. Postal Service, the Defense Intelligence Agency and the National Center for Credibility



Assessments (Polygraph School). Col Rea worked with the State Department to create Anti-Terrorism Training modules for teams traveling to over 50 countries worldwide and with EUROPOL to combat international virtual currency (Bitcoin) criminal activities on the dark web.

After Vertex Solutions, Col Rea continued with independent consulting for various companies including Blue Force, Mesmo, Inc., Betis Corp., and Community Force, continuing to develop new content and designs for diverse learning delivery formats. Rea joined with Datum Software, Inc. in 2018 to assist on an Air University (AU) Project at Maxwell AFB to build a new Learning Management System for AU's colleges and schools. He ended his career on a project with the Bureau of Indian Education writing policy and providing solutions for Indian K-12 schools in over 26 states. Col Rea retired from full-time employment in June 2023.

Col Rea and his wife, Trudy, have been married 41 years, and have lived in Montgomery since 2003. They have two children and two grandchildren. They are members of Frazer Methodist Church where he teaches adult Sunday School and serves with the Prison Ministry Program and the Men's Leadership Council. He is active in the community through the Montgomery Chamber of Commerce, Wright Flyers Association military support group and the Air Force Association. He enjoys playing golf, biking, swimming, and reading.

Col Rea comments on his military service: "It was a fantastic time to serve as a fighter pilot in the Air Force. I gained a lifelong family of friends in the military and from many other countries. The flying was fantastic, with many hours spent over northern Iraq and over Bosnia-Herzegovina. I had some amazing personal experiences such as: (1) Attending Turkish and German weddings, (2) drinking strong coffee in a shepherd's tent in the Israeli countryside and discussing world events with Arab and Jewish men simultaneously, (3) having long conversations with Turkish friends on big piles of handmade rugs, (4) playing with Korean orphans during Christmas in South Korea, (5) attending a formal dinner in a former Nazi bunker in Denmark, (6) leading the Air Force contingent in the Patton Day Parade in Luxembourg, (7) flying with pilots from more than 20 countries, (8) engaging in senior-level discussions with Chinese military, academic, and government leaders and (9) administering the Air Force oath of office at my daughter's commissioning to name a few.

Col Rea states, "People don't need to remember me. They just need to pass the torch of values and lessons for a path to follow Jesus Christ which was passed to me. And remember, those who desire the peace the most are those who must go out and defend it."

Aviation Machinist Mate James L. Tatum: Age 100



Aviation Machinist Mate (AMM) James L. Tatum served three years,11 months and two days in the U.S. Navy during WWII. His Military Occupational Specialty (MOS) was airplane mechanic and aerial gunner. His Naval unit received the Presidential Unit Citation. His entire Naval service was in the Pacific Ocean where he was aboard aircraft carriers in the battles at Tarawa, Kwajalein, Eniwetok, Saipan, Guam and Leyte.



AMM Tatum was born December 29, 1923 at Autauga County, AL, to his parents, James L. Tatum and Sarah Ella Tatum. His brother served in the 101st Airborne in France. He attended Lanier High School in Montgomery, AL; however when the Japanese bombed Pearl Harbor on December 7, 1941, he decided to volunteer and join the U.S. Navy. At age 18, he reported for duty at Birmingham, AL, January 13, 1942.

AMM Tatum completed Boot Camp at the Navy Station Norfolk, VA, followed by six months of aviation machinist training there. He was then

sent to Hollywood, FL, for six weeks of training as an aerial gunner. Next, he was stationed at North Island at San Diego, CA, for more training as an aerial gunner. While there, he few behind the pilots flying dive bombers such as the Grumman TBF Avenger torpedo bomber and the SBD, Scout Dive-Bomber which was the Navy's main carrier-based scout/dive bomber. He was then sent to Alameda, CA, with a VT CV37 (fixed wing) squadron where he worked as a mechanist and as an aerial gunner. This was followed by serving at Monterey, CA, for six weeks, at El Centro, CA, training for night flying and at Los Alamos, CA, for six weeks.

AMM Tatum boarded the Sangamon (CVE-26) a former oiler, a U.S. navy escort carrier, at North Island, San Diego, CA. He was involved in very dangerous service in combat on the deck where he was involved with mechanical maintenance of the airplanes on the carrier. In July 1943, the Sangamon was redesigned CVE-26 and supported the Tarawa Invasion in November 1943. He arrived on the 20th in the Gilberts to support the assault on Tarawa. His first combat battle was the Battle of Tarawa which was fought on November 20-23, 1943 between the United States and Japan in the Tarawa Atoll in the Gilbert Islands and was part of Operation Galvanic, the U.S. invasion of the Gilberts. During the first two days of this operation, her planes struck enemy positions on the island. Then through December 6th, weaponry repairs were made at sea.

During early January 1944, the ship trained off southern California and on the 13th, it sailed west, and from January 31st until mid-February, the Sangamon supported the assault and occupation of Kwajalein. Steaming via Pearl Harbor, the carrier pushed on toward her next amphibious operation, the assault on Kwajalein in the Marshalls. AMM Tatum's second combat was the Battle of Kwajalein which was fought as part of the Pacific campaign of World War II. It took place January 31- February 3, 1944 on Kwajalein Atoll in the Marshall Islands. Employing the hard-learned lessons of the Battle of Tarawa, the United States launched a successful twin assault on the main islands of Kwajalein in the south and Roi-Namur in the north. The Japanese defenders put up stiff resistance although outnumbered and under-prepared. The determined defense of Roi-Namur left only 51 survivors of an original garrison of 3,500. For the US, the battle represented both the next step in its island-hopping march to Japan and a significant morale victory because it was the first time the Americans had penetrated the "outer ring" of the Japanese Pacific sphere. For the Japanese, the battle represented the failure of the beach-line defense. Japanese defenses became prepared in depth, and the Battles of Peleliu, Guam, and the Marianas proved far more costly to the US.

On the 25th, during routine flight operations, a returning fighter failed to hook a wire on landing, broke through the barriers and crashed into parked planes on the forward flight deck. Its belly tank was torn loose and skidded forward spewing flaming fuel. Fire soon spread among the planes. It raged along the flight deck, and flames beat up over the bridge making ship control extremely difficult. The carrier was turned out of the wind so that the fire could be fought. By 4:59 p.m. it was under control. Seven of the crew died in those eight minutes. Seven others were seriously injured, and of the 15 who jumped over the side to escape the flames,13 were rescued and two missing. AMM Tatum was on deck when the crash happened, and he was thrown into the sea. He suffered second degree severe burns to his arms and legs; however after being treated in the sick bay, he returned to duty.

Next, the ship moved on to Eniwetok, where her planes covered the landing forces from the 17th to the 24th. On the latter date, she departed the Marshalls and headed back to Pearl Harbor to complete repairs received during the Kwajalein Invasion and was sent out on CAP and ASP On March 15th, the CVE got underway again. Departing Hawaii, the carrier rendezvoused with Task Group (TG) 50.15, the fast carrier force support group, on the 26th. For the remainder of the month and into April, it escorted that group as it operated north of the Admiralties to refuel and resupply the fast carrier force after it had conducted strikes on the Palaus. In early April, the Sangamon retired to Espiritu Santo and at mid-month, sailed for New Guinea. Briefly attached to the 7th Fleet, the carrier covered the landing at Aitape from the 22d to the 24th, retired to Manus for two days and then returned to the Aitape area where she conducted patrols with five missions to protect the escort carrier group and the target area.

Following repairs, he served in the Marshall Islands area and participated in the Battle of the Philippine Sea that June. The Sangamon then returned to Espiritu Santo whence it departed on May 19th. Rehearsals for the Marianas campaign followed, and on June 2nd, he sailed for the Marshalls. Rendezvousing with TF 53 en route, the carrier covered that force to Kwajalein and then to the Marianas. From the 17th to the 20th, the carrier guarded the force as it steamed to the east of Saipan as a backup force for TF52 which was then engaged in the assault on and the occupation of the island. From June 2-17, the carrier guarded the force as it steamed to the east of Saipan as a backup force for TF52 which was then engaged in the assault on and the occupation of the island. From July 13th to August 1st, the carrier covered the bombardment groups engaged in the capture of Guam. On August 4th, the carrier returned to Eniwetok, and on the 9th, the carrier proceeded to Manus where it was anchored for almost a month. On September 9th, the Sangamon departed Seeadler Harbor, New Guinea. and steamed for Morotai. There from the 15th to the 27th, the carrier again covered Allied assault forces. After the initial waves had landed, her planes shifted from combat support to bombing and strafing missions to destroy Japanese airfields on nearby Halmahera. AMM Tatum participated in the Battle of the Philippine Sea in the liberation of Leyte. From the flight deck, he saw the first Japanese kamikaze hit the USS Santee (CVE-29), an escort carrier. After the Battle of the Philippine Sea, the Sangamon was detached from TF 53. The Battle of Leyte was the last one that the cruiser and he were in, and then he was sent to Seattle, WA, and then to Chicago for training at the advanced engine school. While there, he fell and suffered an injury to his head and was hospitalized in Seattle when WWII ended. He was then sent to New Orleans to be mustered out of military service December 15, 1945.

Amm Tatum recalls attending the USO shows starring Bob Hope. He remembers enjoying the shows at Magnus Island, Leyte, Kwajalein, Eniwetok, Espiritu and the Admiralty Islands. He recalls hearing Tokyo Rose on the radio.

After his military service, AMM Tatum used the G.I. Bill to study farming which paid him \$90.00 per month for four years, and he started farming. He was employed at Maxwell AFB, AL, for 30 years as an aviation machinist in maintenance control in Civil Service on the T-39 airplanes which were used to fly dignitaries. He retired from that employment in 1982. He is a member of the Pine Level Methodist Church. He is a member of the Escort Carriers Association. In the past, he has owned 520 acres where he raised 200 head of cattle and 45 acres of cotton, and he lives in a house there



that he built. AMM Tatum and his wife, Mildred, were married 54 years, and she is now deceased. They had three children, six grandchildren, 10 great-grandchildren and nine great-grandchildren.

AMM Tatum's conclusions about what serving in the U.S. military means to him are: "It meant that I was helping my country. We were at war, and we were fighting someone who wanted to rule the world. I was doing my part as good as I could do. Whatever they told me to do, I tired to do it right as good as I could. It meant a lot to me to know that I was serving my country and knowing that I was helping." He would like people to remember him, he always tried to do the right thing, and if he could help someone, he wanted to help them. He tried to look for the best in a person.



Captain James Edward Klingler: Age 78





Captain James Edward Klingler served three years in the U.S. Army including one hazardous tour in Vietnam. His Military Occupational Specialty (MOS) was Field Artillery. He received the following medals, decorations, badges and ribbons: Purple Heart, National Defense Service Medal, Vietnam Service Medal, Overseas Bar (one), and Vietnam Campaign Medal with 60 DVC, Bronze

Start Medal and the Army Commendation Medal with VDC.

Captain Klingler was born February 19, 1946 in Akron, Ohio, to his parents, Harold H. and Lucie Pickett Klingler. He was reared on a cattle farm in Bullock County, AL. He graduated from high school at Marion Military Institute in 1964 and remained there two more years for part of his college education, and he completed summer camp at Ft. Bragg, N.C., while in ROTC at the University of AL where he graduated with a B.S. Degree in Chemistry and was commissioned as a 2nd Lt. in the U.S. Army in 1968.

Captain Klingler began his active duty military service at Ft. Sill, OK, where he completed six weeks of the basic Artillery course. He was then stationed at Ft. McClellan, AL, where he was a training officer of the Advanced Infantry Training Course for six months. He was then deployed to Vietnam for 12 months from mid 1969 to mid 1970. He was with the Army's 1st of the 30th Artillery where he was in combat as his battery fired the 155 Howitzer with 100 lb. shells which took two people to lift the shells. He was at a fire base during the entire time of his deployment located northwest of Saigon near the Cambodian border. His battery was with the redeployment into Cambodia in 1970. Captain Klingler was wounded by shrapnel in the lower part of his body by incoming fire during the Cambodian Campaign. He was operated upon in Ben Hoa and Saigon, Vietnam, and in the hospital at the Army Garrison at Camp Zama, Japan, where he spent the 4th of July, 1970. He was sent back to the USA to Ft. Gordon, GA, for three weeks and then to Ft. Riley, KS, for one year where he was discharged from the Army August 22, 1971.

Since discharge from the Army, Captain Klingler has spent 53 years as a financial investment adviser. He worked for five years with Merrill Lynch who sent him to New York City for education in financial investment. He

transferred to the Robison-Humphrey LLC for 23 years, and in 2010, he began working with Stifel Nicolas Inc. and is still with that firm.

Captain Klingler and his wife, Jane, have been married 54 years, and they have two children and five grandchildren. They belong to First United Methodist Church in Montgomery, AL. He is a twice past president of the Montgomery Symphony and is still on the board today. He is a member of the Kiwanis Club of Montgomery. He enjoys fishing and hunting quail and doves. On his farm in Bullock County, he has a brood cat-

tle herd and forest products.

Captain Klingler is concerned about America's current situation. He states: "I see many similarities with what I learned in the Artillery and what is going on in our country today. He states, "The artillery along with airpower is used to "soften" the enemy before the ground troops attack. The similarity to this in our country today and the "softening" aspect of yesterday are; today we have military age men streaming across our southern border to do significant damage to our country by them if they so choose. We are not



teaching the civics courses in the government school systems today that we did 50-60 years ago. We are tearing down national monuments across our country which continues to destroy our national heritage. We are removing from history those things that helped make our country great. I am not going to get into the weaponization of our agencies the FBI, IRS, etc. I am not going to get into the crippling of free speech. All of these things have a tendency to cause our people to be silenced. This is not how our country was founded, in fact, it is just the opposite.

This deracination of our history and heritage makes it much easier for an enemy." Captain Klingler's conclusions about his military service are: "Serving in the military helped re-establish my love of country. I do dearly love my country. I do not trust my government." Because he has been working in financial investments, he would like to be remembered as someone who assisted people in making a better financial life.



Sergeant First Class James Edward Pierson: Age 67





Sergeant First Class (SFC) James Edward Pierson served 29 years in the military including 15.5 years in active duty in the U.S. Army and 14 years in the National Guard. His Military Occupational Specialty (MOS) was Unit Level Communications Systems Circuit Controller with Radio Repair and Water Treatment Specialist. He received the following decorations, medals, badges and Army Good Conduct Medal, (5th award), NCO/ Professional Development Ribbon (two), Overseas Service Ribbon (three), Army Service Ribbon, Expert Marksmanship Badge M-16 Rifle, Army Lapel Ribbon, National Defense Service Medal, Air Assault Badge, Driver and Mechanic Badge, Army Meritorious Service Ribbon, Army Commendation Medal (three with

oak leaf clusters), Army Achievement Medal, Southeast Asia Service Medal (with three bronze service stars) and Saudi Arabia Kuwait Liberation Medal. SFC Pierson was born March 10, 1957 in Troy, AL, to his parents, L.C. and Bula Pierson. He was reared in Wetumpka, AL and graduated from Wetumpka High School in 1975.

SFC Pierson volunteered for military service in the U.S. Army in May 1976 under a delayed entry program and reported for duty October 14, 1976 at Ft. Jackson, SC. for basic training which was referred to as Tank Hill, a large water tower at the top of the hill which recruits had to run up after completing vigorous training at the end of the day. He completed eight weeks of boot camp and also trained as a field wireman while there. He was then deployed to serve three years at Baumholder, Germany. He reenlisted and trained for 10 weeks at Ft. Sill, OK, to work as a radio repairman. Next, he served at Ft. Lewis, WA, for two years. His second tour to Germany was to the NATO Air Base at Geilenkirchen, Germany, for three years. He returned to the U.S.A. for one year at Ft. Riley, KS from 1985-86. He re-enlisted and served his third tour to Germany at Bamberg for three years 1986 to 1989. He then returned to the U.S.A. and served at Ft. Campbell, KY, in 1989-1992 where he served in Desert Shield/Desert Storm 1990-1991. His active duty ended July 16, 1992, and he returned to AL, and he immediately began serving in the National Guard July


17, 1992. SFC Pierson served respectively with the 123rd Supply & Support Company / 1208 Quartermaster Supply Company in Goodwater, AL, 1992-2019, The 122nd Troop Command, in Selma, AL, 2019-2001 and in 2001 when SFC Pierson was assigned to HHC 167 Theater Support Command Birmingham, AL 2001-2005. He then worked with the AL Department of Transportation in Alexander City, AL 2004-2007. His last employment was with the Alabama Department of Veterans Affairs at the Tuskegee VA Medical Center as a Medical Support Assistant 2007-2015 and as The Lead Medical Support Assistant in the

as The Lead Medical Support Assistant in the Specialty Clinic in 2015-2017 retiring from all employment in 2017.

SFC Pierson has six children, seven grandchildren and two great-grandchildren. He is an active member of the Disabled American Veterans. He is a member of the Good Hope Missionary Baptist Church in Wetumpka, AL, and serves as an usher. He is a member of the Vet Center Client Stakeholder Board in Montgomery, AL, and the American Legion Post 231 in Wetumpka, AL. He enjoys traveling and attending football games at AL State University.

SFC Pierson's reflections on his military service are, "It provided a successful life full of accomplishments. Without the military, I do not think that I would have accomplished a lot of things that I have done, gone to places or seen things." He would like people to remember him as an outstanding person who would do anything for anybody as long as they are willing to do right by him.

Colonel Dr Patricia Thomas: Age 50





Col Dr Patricia Thomas is currently serving honorably and consistently for the past 27 years. Her military service includes 15 years on Active Duty (1996-2011) in the U.S. Air Force, and 12 years in the U.S. Air Force Reserve (2011-present). Her Air Force Service Code (AFSC)

is Acquisition Contracting. She is a recipient of the fifth highest ranking U.S. military honor, Defense Superior Service Medal. The Defense Superior Service Medal (DSSM) is a military decoration of the United States Department of Defense, which is presented to United States Armed Forces service members who perform superior meritorious service in a position of significant responsibility. Among her many other medals, citations and decorations are the Defense Meritorious Service Medal, and the Joint Service Commendation Medal.

Col Thomas was born March 14, 1974, to her parents, A.J. and Lula C. (Rockett) Wells in Chicago, IL, until moving to Attala County, MS, in 1982. While in high school, she mastered playing the clarinet. She graduated from McAdams High School in McAdams, MS, in 1992. She received a band scholarship to play clarinet at Grambling State University (GSU). While attending GSU, she received an Air Force Reserve Officer Training Corps (AFROTC) scholarship in January 1993. In December 1996, she graduated with a Bachelor's Degree in Marketing and Advertising, and she was commissioned as a Second Lieutenant into the U.S. Air Force to begin her military service.

Col Thomas's first duty station was at Vandenberg Air Force Base (AFB), CA, with the 30th Contracting Squadron. There she became proficient in Operational Contracting while supporting various space and missile missions and engineering squadrons. Her responsibilities also included leading the Construction and Services Flight where she led the implementation of the Government Purchase Card. During this assignment, Col Thomas obtained her Master's in Business Administration (MBA) from the University of La Verne.

Col Thomas' second assignment was at Maxwell AFB-Gunter Annex, AL. She was assigned to the Standards Systems Group where she became proficient in systems contracting and program management. During this timeframe, Col Thomas led the acquisition team that launched the satellite supporting the Air Force Portal. In 2001, she deployed to Pristina, Kosovo in southeastern Europe as the Lead Contracting Officer for NATO led Kosovo Force (KFOR) helping to secure the Balkans and to maintain a safe and secure environment for our US and NATO Allies. She returned to the US and continued to serve at Gunter-Annex until she was assigned to Tuskegee University Air Force ROTC, 'Home of the Tuskegee Airmen', as the Assistant Professor of Aerospace Studies. She taught sophomores USAF history and was the Senior Recruiting Officer and Education Officer from June 2003 – July 2006. During this assignment, she instituted the Bridge Scholarship where students with 5-year technical

majors such as engineering and nursing can receive

a one-year scholarship to cover their tuition fees.

Smyrna, GA, administering weapon system contracts for all branches of the U.S. military. As Deputy Group Chief of Acquisitions, one of her most memorable career moments was administering the contract for the Mine Resistance Ambush Protective (MRAP) vehicle which is designed to withstand improvised explosive devices and ambushes.

While assigned to DCMA Atlanta, Col Dr Thomas embarked on her second deployment. She was deployed to support Operation Iraqi Freedom July 2007 to July 2008 at Balad (Anaconda), Iraqi. She commanded this effort as the Theater Lead Contracting Officer with two primary missions: Theaterwide Transportation Mission (TTM) and Combat Life Support Services (CLSS). These missions required her to dangerously travel through the entire country on average accumulating over 1200 flight hours. Following this assignment, Col Dr Thomas received the Defense Meritorious Service Medal. After her tour in Iraq, Col Dr Thomas served at the Air Command and Staff College at Maxwell AFB, AL from May 2009 – November 2011 teaching military leadership to joint force military majors and American Cultural Studies to international officers.

Col Dr Thomas transferred to the USAF Reserve in December 2011 and served as the Acquisition Contracting Officer with DCMA Manassas, VA. She was promoted to the rank of Lieutenant Colonel in October 2012, and in March 2013, Col Dr Thomas deployed to support Operation Enduring Freedom in Khandar, Afghanistan. During this timeframe, she led the entire southern region as the Southern Afghanistan Contracting Lead. She developed and designed the historical 'Operation Tire Strike" which involved returning leased vehicles back to the original leasing companies saving the US tax payers millions of dollars.

From 2014-2017, Col Dr Thomas led the entire DCMA organization Contract Closeout effort resolving several closeout issues and taking the entire organization out of 'Red Zone' into the 'Green Zone'. Within DCMA, Col Dr Thomas' assignments included DCMA Baltimore and supporting DCMA Huntsville, DCMA Lockheed Martin Fort Worth, DCMA Dallas, DCMA Lockheed Martin Orlando and DCMA Santa Ana. Her last assignment with DCMA was supporting DCMA Central Region in Chicago, IL, and the Senior Reservist for the entire agency.

In 2018, Col Dr Thomas was one of less than 1% of the Lt Cols and Cols selected to attend the prestigious Air War College (AWC) at Maxwell AFB, AL. During this time, she was also promoted to Colonel. While attending AWC, Col Dr Thomas led her team in establishing a Civil Air Patrol Unit at Goodwin Middle School, and their effort yielded accolades from the Secretary of the Air Force, the Honorable Heather A. Wilson. During this timeframe, Col Dr Thomas earned a Master's Degree in Strategic Studies from the Air University and a Master's Degree in Organizational Leadership from Capella University.

In 2020, Col Dr Thomas, obtained her Doctorate in Organizational Leadership from the University of Phoenix. Her dissertation is titled, "Factors Contributing to Promotion of Females U.S. Air Force Field Grade Officers..", aimed to shed light on some of the reasons females exit the USAF. Once leaving DCMA, Col Dr Thomas was assigned to serve as the Individual Mobilization Augmentee (IMA) to the

Senior Contracting Official for Pacific Command

and USINDOPACOM located at Joint Base Pearl Harbor Hickam (JBPHH), Hawaii. Colonel Thomas is one of only four Colonels in the USAF Reserve Contracting career field.

Most recently, Colonel Thomas was hand selected to serve as the Acting Reserve Advisor to the Air University Commander and President. She also serves as the Program Director of the Air Reserve Component Seminar supporting Air Force Reserve and Air National Guard Majors through Colonels at Maxwell AFB, AL.

Col Dr Thomas' philosophy about her military service is: "As I reflect over my 27 years of service, my military career has been outstanding. After having my first child at the age of 14, my desire was to make my parents proud and to be a successful parent. The military



gave me the opportunity to do both and to become an amazing military officer and citizen. I have enjoyed defending our nation, and I have embraced the challenges along the way. I would not trade it for anything. I look forward to serving for many more years to come. I am proud that my oldest son has joined the U.S. Army and is serving as a Chaplain. My youngest son is currently enrolled in Tuskegee University's AFROTC program. Col Dr Thomas is a Christian and someone who is unselfishly volunteering, giving and supporting others, and pours into our youth so they too can believe that they can achieve greatness as well.

Col Thomas has three children and three grandchildren. She is a member of the Maxwell Faith Chapel at Maxwell AFB, AL. She enjoys volunteering, exercising and taking cruises. She is a member of Iota Phi Lambda Sorority, Inc., serving as the National Risk Management Chair and the Southern Region Financial and Recording Secretary. She is also a member of Kappa Epsilon Psi Military Sorority.

In 2021, Col Dr Thomas received proclamations from Attala County, MS, and McAdams High School in McAdams, MS, recognizing her as the first African-American female to be promoted to the rank of colonel in the U.S. Air Force from Attala County.

In 2022, Col Thomas launched the Colonel Dr Patricia Wells-Thomas (PWT) Foundation. The primary reason for starting this foundation is to help veterans and youth. This involves teaching life skills to youth. Additionally, this foundation provides a scholarship to McAdams High School Seniors. The scholarship grants \$1,500 to a McAdams High School senior that will be attending one of the 107 Historically Black Colleges and Universities (HBCUs). If the student participates in an ROTC program at the HBCU, an additional \$500 is awarded. Students can apply from December 1st through March 1st each year. The Foundation hosts a Veterans Day socks drive and provides Christmas cards to the residents at the Crowne Health Care Center in Montgomery, AL.

Sergeant First Class Eddie Frank Harris: Age 66





Sergeant First Class (SFC) Eddie Frank Harris served 20 years in the U.S. Military including four years in the U.S. Marine Corps and 16 years in the U.S. Army. While serving in the U.S. Marine Corps, his Military field includes ground forces who are trained to locate and destroy the enemy by fire and maneuver or repel their assault by fire and close combat. These roles all require high levels of fitness, mental toughness, and tactical abilities. His MOS in the U.S. Army was Supply Specialist. He received the following medals, decorations, awards and ribbons: Meritorious Service Medal, Army Commendation Medal (five), Army Achievement

Medal (two), Army Meritorious Unit Commendation, Army Good Conduct Medal, National Defense Service Medal, Army Retiree Lapel Button, Southwest Asia Service Medal with three Bronze service stars, Noncommissioned Officer Professional Development ribbon with numeral three, Army Service Medal, Overseas Service Medal (three), Kuwait Liberation Medal, Kuwait Liberation Medal (Southeast Asia), Marksman Badge (rifle), Driver and Mechanics Badge and Drill Sergeant Identification Badge.

SFC Harris was born March 5, 1958 to his parents, O.B. and Larceina Harris in Goshen, AL. He had 11 siblings. He was reared in Glenwood, AL, and attended Woodford Avenue High School, Luverne AL. He was later transferred to Brantley High School where he played fullback in football for three years, and during his senior year at the age of age 17, he voluntarily enlisted in the U.S. Marines February 27,1976. He earned his GED while serving in the Marines in 1979.

SFC Harris completed Marine Corps Boot Camp at the Marine Corps Recruit Depot Parris Island, South Carolina, where he graduated June 14, 1976. From there, he was assigned to Alpha Company 1st Battalion 6th Marine Corps, Camp Lejeune, N.C., for three months training in special weapons. He took leave to Montgomery, Alabama where he married his wife Denise, November 1, 1976. The following week he deployed to the Mediterranean Cruise on the USS Fort Snelling (LSD-30), a Thomason Class dock landing ship, with the 34th Marine Amphibious Unit for seven months. He sailed to Spain, Italy, Greece, Egypt and Kenya. A storm at sea caused internal damage to the USS Snelling, and the ship was tossed onto its side and took on water. When it arrived at a port in Spain, the Fort Snelling was deboarded because of the unrepairable damage. He was transferred to the USS Guam (LPH-9), an Iwo Jima amphibious assault ship, to complete his Mediterranean deployment. The Marines and equipment were loaded onto the USS Guam. On January 17, 1977 in Barcelona, Spain, a landing ship craft being used as a liberty board by the USS Trenton and the USS Guam with over 124 US sailors and Marines was run into by the Basque freighter, Uriea, destroying the small boat and hurling service members into the harbor. Many were rescued, but 49 perished. SFC Harris returned to U.S. Marine Corp Base Camp LeJeune and completed his time of service, and he was Honorably Discharged from the U.S. Marine Corps February 27, 1980.

SFC Harris remained a civilian for only 30 days. He re-entered military service in the U.S. Army May 30, 1980 and completed Training at Company A , 2nd Battalion 4th Brigade, Fort Knox, Kentucky. He was sent to HHC, 4th Bn, QM Bde, U.S. Army Quartermaster Brigade, Ft. Lee, VA, for one year where he was a Handling Equipment Instructor. He received Permanent Change of Station, August 27, 1981 to Company A 2nd S&T Bn 2nd Infantry Division,

Dongducheon, South Korea, on an unaccompanied tour for one year where he was a Service Receiving-Edit Manager. He had Permanent Change of Station (PCS) to Fort Benning, GA, with the 197th Infantry Brigade. He completed 60 days of desert training at Fort Irving, CA. SFC Harris returned to Fort Benning, GA, where he reenlisted and was transferred to 598th Maintenance Company. He was selected for Drill Sergeant School where he graduated and served as a Platoon Drill Sergeant with the Harmony Church Installation for two years. He received Permanent Change of Station orders to S & T Trp RSS 2nd ACR on December 3,1986 on a three year accompanied tour to Nuremberg, Germany. While on assignment in Germany, he enrolled in Central Texas College completing a Course in Mechanic, and Supervisor Service Administrative Management. In1989, he was stationed back at 598th Maintenance Company at Fort Benning, GA.

SFC Harris was deployed August 12,1990 to The Persian Gulf War Operation Desert Shield/Desert Storm, Dharan, Saudi Arabia, as a supply unit for 13 months. On 25 February 1991, a Scud missile hit a U.S. Army barracks of the 14th Quartermaster Detachment out of Greensburg, PA, that was attached to 598th Maintenance stationed in Dhahran, Saudi Arabia, killing 28 soldiers and injuring over 100. He was there for the duration of duty. He returned to the USA to serve at Fort Benning with the 598th Maintenance Company. His second tour to Germany was unaccompanied in 1993 to Baumholder, Germany, for two years where he worked in front line supply. His last duty station was with Kilo Company at the Hunter Air Field U.S. Army Garrison, Savannah, GA, where he retired from all military service May 30,1996.

After his military retirement, SFC Harris used the G.I. Bill and completed technology training via correspondence earning an Associate Degree as Master Automotive Technician from the McGraw-Hill Continuing Education Center. He then earned an Associate Degree in Automative Service Technology from John M. Patterson State Technical College. The technical and mechanical skills enabled SFC Harris to gain employment as a Diesel Mechanic with Colonial Bread Company for 10 years, and employment at Jack Ingram Motors as an Automotive Technician for 18 years. He retired from all employment in 2014.



SFC Harris and his wife, Denise Summerlin Harris, have been married 47 years; they had two sons, Dr. Frankco Harris (Valerie), a New York City pastor and the late Anthoney Harris and four grandchildren. They have traveled together from state to state, overseas and abroad. They are members of the Free and Accepted Church in Montgomery, AL, where he serves as a deacon, and she is a Missionary. They are engaged in their community and active in their home-owners' association where Denise serves as an officer. He is also a lifetime member of the Disabled American Veterans. He can be seen helping seniors, children and adults mentally and spiritually. His selfless acts are innumerable.

SFC Harris' conclusions about his military service are, "It set my life on the way that I live right now. I was able to establish a provision for my family. I became a well groomed and knowledgeable person learning about different parts of the world and how people lived. To me, it was a way of life." He would like people to remember him as an honest, fair and decent person.



Tech Sergeant Donald Allen Heil: Age 76





Tech Sergeant (TSgt) Donald Allen Heil served 23 years in the U.S. Air Force. His Air Force Specialty Code (AFSC) was Telephone Technician Specialist. During his entire military service, he worked as a liaison with the cities where the military bases were located wherever that he served setting up the communications He received the following medals, decorations, citations and ribbons: Air Force Good Conduct Medal with Bronze and Silver Stars, Air and Space Outstanding Unit Award Ribbon, Air and Space Overseas Long Tour Ribbon, Air and Space Overseas Short Tour Ribbon, Air and Space Commendation Medal, Air and Space Longevity Service Ribbon, Space


Training Ribbon, Army of Occupation Medal in Germany, National Defense Service Medal and Armed Forces Expeditionary Medal.

TSgt Heil was born November 24, 1947 to his parents, Leonard and Jean Heil at Kankakee, IL. His father served in the Navy's Seabees in WWI, and his son-n-law served in the U.S. Marines and in the Air Force. He was reared in Marshalltown, IA, where he graduated from Marshalltown High School in 1966. After working at fast food and other retail establishments, he volunteered for military service entering military service November 24, 1967. TSgt Heil began his military service at Lackland Air Force Base (AFB), TX, where he had six weeks of Basic Training. He was then sent to Sheppard AFB, TX, for 16 weeks of training in telephone communications technology. His first assignment was at Barksdale AFB, LA, for two years. He was deployed to

Taegu Air Base, Korea in 1970 for 16 months. He deactivated for a few weeks July 4, 1971, and after a few weeks, he reenlisted for Active Duty and reported to Randolph Air Force Base, TX. His first assignment after reenlistment was at Chanute AFB, IL, for one year. This was followed by an overseas tour at Ramstein Air Base, Germany for four years, and this was an accompanied tour. He returned to the USA and served at Dyess AFB, TX, in 1976-1980. His second accompanied tour to Germany was at the

Tempelhof Air Station at Berlin, Germany, in 1980-1983. He returned to the U.S.A. and served at Robins AFB, GA, in 1983-1991 where he retired from military service February 1, 1991.

After his military retirement, TSgt Heil worked in 2001-2006 at fast food businesses, starting up and operating a lawn-sprinkler business and then working in school cafeterias. He enjoys fishing, traveling and visiting with friends. He serves as an Elder at the Community of Christ Church at Warner Robbins, GA. He is a member of the VFW Unit 6126 at Perry, GA. He and his wife, Brenda, have been married 54 years, and they have two children and one grandchild. TSgt Heil's conclusions about what serving in the U.S.



military means to him are: 'It meant that I was helping Americans to be safe. I was helping further the freedom of people in America. I was serving my country." He would like people to remember him as a good American who loved his country who wanted better for other people.

2024 National Vietnam War **Veterans Day Ceremony**



The 2024 National Vietnam War Veterans Day Ceremony was held at 10:00 a.m. at the VVA Memorial Garden in the Greenwood Cemetery in Montgomery, AL, on March 29, 2024. Members of Chapter 607 Vietnam Veterans of America conducted the ceremony led by its President, Jessie Donaldson. John Eidsmoe served as Master of Ceremonies. After the Pledge of Allegiance to America's flag, the National Anthem was sung by all who were present followed by a solo of "Mansions of the Lord" sung by Bill Thomas. It still serves as a method of mourning among the living as attending the funeral is not always possible for soldiers still in combat.

The names of veterans from the counties of Montgomery, Elmore, Bullock, Autauga, Macon and Russell who lost their lives in Vietnam were read. John Eidsmoe and Mary Huffman sang "O Valiant Hearts" as a duet. Vietnam veterans per-

formed the 13 Folds of Honor on the American flag while each fold's meaning was described. The Missing Man Table ceremony was performed. Three volleys were fired by the 607 Honor "Taps" were Guard, and played by the bugler, Babs Couch. The Ceremony ended with a benediction by Chapter 607's John Eidsmoe.

The River Region and Gathering of Eagles Opportunity

Wait, I know what the River Region is... it's my home!!! But what is the Gathering of Eagles (GOE)? The GOE is part of Maxwell Air Force Base's Air Command and Staff College (ACSC). Each year, ACSC prepares about 500 students representing every U.S. military service, as well as several federal agencies, and 65 partner nations. In addition to the rigorous curriculum focusing on leadership in the operational environment, there are numerous other activities and events that enrich the year-long experience. One of them is the GOE. The GOE idea began in 1980, when retired Brig. Gen. Paul Tibbets (pilot of the Enola Gay) visited ACSC. During his visit, he shared some of his remarkable experiences, which sparked an interest to hear first-hand from other trail blazers in their field. The first official GOE event, initially known as "Great Moments in Aviation History," took place in 1982. This annual aviation event continues to honor the legacy of airpower, and now space and cyber power, as it helps inspire future leaders.

The GOE concept has grown into much more than a meeting with heroes. The ACSC students, with faculty advisors, work to strengthen relationships with the River Region community partners, with a deep focus on Science, Technology, Engineering, and Mathematics (STEM). It raises funds for scholarships to River Region students to attend the National Flight Academy, Space Camp, Aviation Camp, Cyber Camp, and Red Tail Flight Academy. The GOE also sponsors ROTC Scholarships. The GOE team even gets face-to-face, conducting site visits and mentoring engagements at STARBASE Maxwell as well as throughout River Region Schools. All of this supports their motto:

HONORING HERITAGE - SERVING COMMUNITY - FORGING FUTURES

During the CAPSTONE event, running from **6-10 May** this year, eight aerospace leaders will share their stories with the ACSC (and hint, also an opportunity for you!). These leaders include:

- 1. **SFC (Ret) Clifford Newman** served as a Special Forces Team Leader. In Vietnam, he volunteered for Bright Light missions, requiring him to control Close Air Support for troops in contact, as well as operations to extract wounded and fallen warriors. He also led the first combat high-altitude low opening jump in U.S. history.
- 2. Lt Gen (Ret) David Deptula has over 50 years of contributions to air and space power. He was key in Desert Storm planning and execution. He masterminded "Global Reach, Global Power," the Air Force's first Service-wide mission statement since its inception. As the Combined Joint Task Force Operation Northern Watch Commander, he flew over 80 F-15 combat missions. Currently, he helps shape, and impact air, space, and cyber power through his role as the Dean of the Mitchell Institute for Aerospace Studies.
- 3. Lt Col (Ret) Tim "Rhino" Bennett flew F-15Es on active duty and then F-16s in the South Carolina Air National Guard. He is a Desert Storm veteran and flew combat missions in both fighters. He has the first, and only, air-to-air kill in the F-15E...using an air-to-ground weapon!

- 4. **Capt (Ret) Guy Gruters** was a Vietnam O-1 Forward Air Controller (FAC) followed by missions as an F-100 Misty Super FAC. He flew 412 combat missions, coordinating attacks on hundreds of enemy positions. On one perilous mission, Capt Gruters was shot down and held POW for 1,912 days. As a POW, he cared for Medal of Honor winner Capt Lance P. Sijan, and led and taught the other prisoners tap code communication. Capt Gruters exemplifies the highest in heroism, honor, perseverance, and strength.
- 5. **Mr. Gene Kranz**, if his schedule permits, will also attend. He is a household name in the Space Program. But first, he served the USAF in Korea as an F-86 pilot. After his USAF service, he joined NASA and became one of the first and most iconic NASA Flight Directors, leading the Gemini 5, Apollo 11, Apollo 13 (Houston, we have a problem) and what would become the last moon mission, Apollo 17. He rose to become NASA's Mission Operations Director before retirement.
- 6. **Dr. Natalie Crawford** is a Senior Fellow and Distinguished Chair for Air and Space Policy at the RAND Corp. She excelled in many roles, most notably as Vice President and Director of Project Air Force. Dr. Crawford shaped numerous RAND research projects. Twice, she earned the Air Force's Decoration for Exceptional Civilian Service. Dr. Crawford also earned the Air Force Analytic Community's Lifetime Achievement Award, the Lt. Gen. Glenn Kent Leadership Award, and the Vance R. Wanner Memorial Award from the Military Operations Research Society.
- 7. **Col (Ret) James Harvey III**, a Tuskegee Airman, flew with the 332nd Fighter Group's 99th Fighter Squadron in WWII. In the early days of the Air Force, he and his team from the 332nd won the first Top Gun competition. He was also the first African-American fighter pilot to fly combat operations in the Korean War. He earned a Distinguished Flying Cross and was awarded the Congressional Gold Medal in 2006. Col Harvey is one of the last living Tuskegee Airmen.
- 8. **Gen (Ret) Jeffrey Harrigian** served as the United States Air Forces in Europe and Air Forces Africa Commander from May 2020 to June 2022. He concurrently served as the commander of Allied Air Command and director of the Joint Air Power Competence Center. He has flown over 4,100 hours in the F-22, F-15C, A/OA-37 and MQ-1 and was instrumental in the development of the F-22 and F-35. A combat-tested warrior, he flew in Operations Just Cause, Iraqi Freedom, Inherent Resolve, Atlantic Resolve, and Allies Refuge.

The Navy Descends on Montgomery

Montgomery hosted the Capitol's first Navy Week from April 1 to 7. The celebration emphasized the importance of the U.S. Navy to Montgomery, the state of Alabama, and the nation.

Montgomery Mayor Steven Reed issued a proclamation to salute the Navy and kick off Navy Week. "This week as we enjoy the festivities, let us also renew our commitment to supporting our service members, veterans and their families, fostering a community that recognizes and appreciates their unyielding commitment to our nation," said Reed. The Navy's senior executive for the week is Rear Adm. Charles "Mike" Brown, Reserve Deputy Chief of Naval Operations for Information Warfare, Office of the Chief of Naval Operations.

"The purpose of Navy Week is to bring your Navy closer to you," said Admiral Brown. "Closer to the citizens of Alabama, the citizens of Montgomery and help you see the value that you receive every day of a globally deployed force that protects America's security, its economic prosperity and its way of life."

The Alabama Department of Archives and History hosted the Navy Band Southeast Woodwind Quintet on Tuesday. On Thursday crew members of the U.S.S. Constitution, U.S.S. Montgomery littoral combat ship (LCS 8), and U.S.S. Alabama ballistic missile submarine (SSBN731).

Members of the Navy attended the Alabama State University versus Troy baseball game on Tuesday night. Participating Navy organizations include Navy Band Southeast, USS Constitution, Naval Meteorology and Oceanography Command, United States Ceremonial Guard and Color Guard, Navy Talent Acquisition Group Atlanta, U.S. Navy Esports, U.S. Naval Academy, Navy History and Heritage Command, nuclear-power Ohio-class guided-missile submarine USS Alabama (SSBN 731), and the Independence-class Littoral Combat Ship USS Montgomery (LCS 8).







In addition to Brown, Command Master Chief Keith Wilkerson with MyNavy Career Center participated as a Navy senior executive host in the city of Montgomery during Navy Week. There was a STEM (science, technology, engineering and math) Expo at Maxwell Air Force Base on Friday, Saturday, and Sunday. 30 exhibitors participated in the expo including: Alabama State, the 20th Special Forces Group, Faulkner University, the Air Force Wargaming Institute, Auburn University Montgomery, Troy University, the U.S. Naval Academy, the Space and Rocket Center, and more.

The week concluded with an Air Show on Saturday and Sunday at Maxwell Air Force Base. The air show will feature a performance by the U.S. Navy Blue Angels. The Blue Angels team is stationed at Forrest Sherman Field, at the Naval Air Station in Pensacola, Florida, during the air show season. The squadron spends January through March training at Naval Air Facility in El Centro, California. They fly the Navy's F/A-18 fighter jet.

Additional performers include the U.S. Army Golden Knights Parachute Team, F-16 Viper Demo Team, an F-16 and a World War II era P-51 Mustang both in Tuskegee Airmen Red Tails paint schemes, Greg Koontz of Ashville who perform aerial aerobatics, Rob Holland performing aerial aerobatics in his customized MXS-RH airplane, the Redline aerial aerobatics team of Ken Rieder and Austin Rieder flying Van's RV-8 2-seat, tandem aircraft, Kyle Fowler flying the unconventional delta-winged Long EZ, and Bob Carlton flying a twin jet engine Foxjet sailplane.

In addition a MH139 helicopter, a Fairchild A-10C Thunderbolt II attack bomber, F-15 Strike Eagle, F1-A jet, T-38 jet trainer, T-68 Texan trainer, HC-130J Combat King II, a PT-7 biplane the Tuskegee Airmen trained on, a Fairchild PT-19A Cornell trainer, KC-135 Stratotanker, and a Soviet Mikoyan-Gurevich Mig-17 were on display for the event. There will be a total of 15 Navy weeks across the U.S.A. during 2024.


God Knows YOUR Name

O Death, Where Is Your Sting?

It's been my experience that funeral home directors generally have a great sense of humor. I asked a gentleman about this once and he explained that a sense of humor is the only thing that saved him from awful depression. I can imagine these men and women deal with the greatest of tragedies.

But on the other hand, I've heard some interesting stories from them. One funeral home employee told me about trying to salvage a graveside service after several pallbearers were drunk, and one fell into the open grave. I can't imagine

officiating at this service and trying to recoup! It wasn't funny to me at the time, but it was memorable.

I was in the Old Live Oak Cemetery in Selma conducting a service not far from the mausoleum of Alabama Sen. William Rufus King, the only Alabamian to serve as U.S. vice president, albeit briefly. He was sworn in on the island of Cuba where he'd traveled for his health, only to die a month later. He also became the only vice president to be sworn in on foreign soil. Today he's honored as one of the founders of Selma as well as James Buchanan's vice

president, at least for a few weeks. Nevertheless, I was nearby this site and trying to comfort the family when I felt

sharp pain in my feet and legs. I tried to be discreet but found to my dismay

that I was standing in a nest of yellow jackets. I think I was stung three times,

but managed to complete the service. A dignified and cultured Selmian, Louise

Swertfeger, later told me she was stung repeatedly as well, but I remember her sitting and looking, well, dignified and cultured, despite this.

I always think of this funeral when I read Paul's word in 1 Corinthians: "O Death, where is your sting? O Hades, where is your victory?" (1 Corinthians 15: 55).

All my life I've heard preachers explain this verse to their congregations. Christ took our punishment on the cross temporally so that we can be released from the sting of death eternally.

Death does sting. No one of us wants to see the deaths of those we love, except in times when their suffering is so terrible with no hope of recovery. Most often death is as unwelcome as a thief in the night. The death angel is normally not invited inside our homes to visit.

But Paul reminded his readers, and us, that the sting of death is temporary. Those who believe and follow Christ are assured that he accompanies us across the River of Death and brings us safely home to the father.

This is our resurrection hope. -30-





You've probably already noticed the fresh strawberries at local farmer's markets. While modern farming and supply chains make strawberries available year-round, there's nothing quite like the taste of a fresh strawberry grown right here in Alabama.

Strawberries aren't just a treat for your taste buds. They're loaded with antioxidants, vitamins, and fiber, so you can enjoy them with little or no guilt. Blessed as we are here in Alabama, we can enjoy their deliciousness fresh from the farm for most of the late spring and summer months.

To pick the best strawberries, look for a bright red color and a fresh green cap. Avoid those with bruises or soft spots, as those poor berries have probably been abused. Gently squeeze the berry; if it's ripe, it should have a little "give". Too firm means it's not ready. Too soft, and it may still be good, but it needs to go into a dish or a jar of preserves ASAP.

To clean your strawberries, rinse--don't soak--them under cool running water and gently pat dry. Soaking can damage them, and the longer you let strawberries sit underwater, the more likely this is. Strawberries are best eaten within a day or two after you buy them, but if you need to store them for longer, keep them in the fridge, unwashed, in a shallow container lined with paper towels.

There are countless ways you can enjoy this taste of sunshine and happiness, from adding them to your breakfast cereal to that latenight snack. Adding sliced strawberries to any green salad makes them the perfect compliment to any meal, and then, of course, there's the desserts.

STRAWBERRY CLOUD

Ingredients:

- 1 Strawberry Jello®, 6 oz. box (the big size)
- 1 angel food cake (store-bought)
- 1 Cool Whip®, 8 oz. (regular size)
- cups strawberries, sliced 1-2

Prepare the strawberry Jello® according to the package instructions in advance. (You want it chilled and firm.)

Southern Gardening







Did you know that the term of one having a "green thumb" has been declared a type of intelligence. A Harvard professor who studied educational psychology in college, Howard Gardner, declared this fact in his "Theory of Multiple Intelligences." He found areas of the brain which 'light up" when certain abilities are activated. We have known people with abilities in the areas of music, mathematics, and

languages. He calls this green thumb knowledge "naturalist" intelligence. These are the people who go on vacation and tour botanical gardens, are comfortable outdoors, more interested in what plants they will add to their garden in the coming year, than keeping up with ball games. So, all of you green thumbs, it is time to get outdoors in our own flower beds and gardens.

I heard a woman in the garden center exclaim that she had to hurry to plant her caladiums and this was the end of March. I wanted to tell her that planting them now was a waste of time since 1. the squirrels will probably dig many up and 2. caladiums will not shoot up until the ground temperatures are almost 60 degrees. After years of trial and error, May is the best month to get these caladiums in the ground. Now that the spectre of a hard freeze is over, time to plant begonias, impatiens, all sorts of bulbs, except tulips, and perennials. Sowing seed directly into the garden soil such as Cleome, Zinnias, and Cosmos should be done this month. Other seeds are better sown in a flat of soil and then transplanted into the garden area, but these flowers do better directly sown into the garden.

PLANT OF THE MONTH--AJUGA REPTANS



The common name for this tough ground cover is bugleweed or carpet bugleweed. Ajuga is a shade loving ground cover that once established is trouble free as far as maintenance is concerned.

No pruning back, hardly

lowing weeds in its mat of roots, and a prolific bloomer. It needs well drained soil, moderate fertilizer, and shade. It can tolerate some sun, and definitely will not survive wet feet. The tiny bugle of blue flowers are the most common, but does come in white, 'Alba'; pink 'Rosea'; and burgundy 'Bronze Beauty. The foliage has crinkled leaves about 6 inches long and can be metallic tinted,



solid green or variegated. This plant is cold hardy and is even grown in Nova Scotia. Once established you will be enjoying Ajuga for years to come.
